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## Executive Summary

The Hospital Council of Northern and Central California - on behalf of Alta Bates Summit Medical Center, Eden Medical Center, Kaiser Permanente (Oakland, Hayward and Fremont), Saint Rose Hospital, Valley Care Health System, and Washington Hospital - commissioned the Alameda County Public Health Department to prepare Select Health Indicators for Cities in Alameda County, 2004.

The purpose of the report is to inform the hospital community about the health status of county and city residents, to help in identifying gaps in service, and to assist in developing culturally appropriate programs that target high-risk populations. The report includes health and demographic indicators selected by the Hospital Council in the following areas: maternal and child health, chronic diseases, mental disorders, leading causes of death, and injuries.

All indicators are examined by age, race/ethnicity, sex, city, and county region. Where possible, comparisons are made to state and national rates, as well as Healthy People 2010 (HP2010) national objectives.

## Major Findings

This report highlights geographic and race/ethnic health disparities in Alameda County. For most health indicators, a great deal of variation in rates can be observed across cities. The reason for this variation is not immediately clear, but may result from a strong influence of one demographic subgroup or another as well as the influence of local environmental and socioeconomic factors. In many instances, rates are not presented for city or subgroup due to small numbers of cases (e.g., only three deaths in a given race/ethnic group). This means that we are unable to draw conclusions, either favorable or unfavorable, about these subpopulations.

Not all indicators examined have a corresponding HP2010 objective. For those indicators that do, the county as a whole has not met any of the HP2010 objectives. Since most of the data analyzed for this report are for the period 2000-2002, a number of years remain to reach these HP2010 objectives. Nonetheless, a number of cities have met HP2010 objectives for specific indicators. While these local objectives may be met, it is important to
sustain attention on the prevention and treatment of these health conditions to continue to meet the objectives. Cities or areas currently meeting specific HP2010 objectives are listed below by health indicator:

- Low birth weight Albany and Castro Valley meet the HP2010 objective of $5.0 \%$ or less of newborns weighing less than 2,500 grams.
- Coronary heart disease mortality Albany, Berkeley, Castro Valley, Emeryville, Fremont, Newark, Piedmont, and Union City meet the HP2010 objective of 166 or fewer deaths per 100,000 population.
- Stroke mortality Albany, Ashland, Fairview, Newark, and Piedmont meet the HP2010 objective of 48 or fewer deaths per 100,000 population.
- Lung cancer Alameda, Berkeley, Fairview, and Dublin meet the HP2010 objective of 44.9 or fewer deaths per 100,000 population.
- Colorectal cancer No city meets the HP2010 objective of 13.9 or fewer deaths per 100,000 population, although Fremont and Livermore are very close with a rate of 14 per 100,000 population.
- Breast cancer mortality Union City is the only city that meets the HP2010 objective of 22.3 or fewer deaths per 100,000 women.
- Prostate cancer Alameda, Fremont, Hayward, Livermore, Pleasanton, and San Leandro meet the HP2010 objective of 28.8 or fewer deaths per 100,000 men. The county as a whole is close to meeting the objective with a rate of 29.7 deaths per 100,000 men.
- Unintentional injury mortality Alameda, Dublin, Fremont, and Pleasanton meet the HP2010 objective of 17.5 or fewer deaths per 100,000 population.
- Homicide Berkeley and Fremont meet the HP2010 objective of 3.0 or fewer deaths per 100,000 population.

There is a great deal of variation in health status, as well as demographic and socioeconomic characteristics, observed across cities in Alameda County. Oakland, Cherryland, and Ashland have similar demographic profiles, with a high percentage of single mothers, a low percentage of persons who have received a high school education, and a high percentage of non-English speakers. Oakland, along with Berkeley, also has a high percentage of persons in poverty. The percentage of persons living in poverty ranges from $2 \%$ in Piedmont to $20 \%$ in Berkeley. Piedmont has residents with a high educational level and a low percentage of persons who do not speak English well.

For most health indicators examined, the city of Oakland bears the greatest burden of poor health outcomes. Oakland has the highest rates of teen births; mortality due to stroke, prostate cancer, and homicide; asthma hospitalizations, and alcohol and drug related hospitalizations.

Poor health outcomes for a number of the indicators examined are also concentrated in the cities of Ashland (high teen births, mortality due to lung cancer, colorectal cancer and unintentional injuries); Cherryland (high teen birth, mortality due to diabetes, coronary heart disease, and stroke); San Lorenzo (diabetes, mortality due to stroke, lung cancer, prostate cancer and colorectal cancer) and Newark (diabetes, lung, colorectal and breast cancer mortality).

Emeryville and San Leandro also have high rates of low birth weight; Berkeley and Castro Valley have high breast cancer mortality rates; Hayward has a high teen birth rate, coronary heart disease mortality and alcohol related hospitalization rate; Alameda has high rate of coronary heart disease mortality; Pleasanton has a high colorectal cancer mortality rate and, along with Livermore, the highest rate of hospitalization for depression.

As noted in other reports produced by the ACPHD, African Americans bear the greatest burden of illness and mortality of any other race/ethnic group in Alameda County. They have the lowest rates of up-to-date immunizations and high rates of low birth weight, chronic diseases, unintentional injury mortality and homicide, as well as drug- and alcohol-related hospitalizations. Latinos have the highest rates of teen births, and a high rate of diabetes and obesity. Pacific Islanders have the highest rate of coronary heart disease mortality in Alameda County. Whites have the highest rates of hospitalizations due to depression and, along with African Americans, the highest rates of alcohol-related hospitalizations.

## 1 Introduction

Select Health Indicators for Cities in Alameda County was prepared by the Community Assessment, Planning, and Education Unit (CAPE) of the Alameda County Public Health Department for the Hospital Council of Northern and Central California. This report was requested on behalf of the following Alameda County hospitals: Alta Bates Summit Medical Center, Eden Medical Center, Kaiser Permanente Oakland, Hayward and Fremont, Saint Rose Hospital, Valley Care Health System, and Washington Hospital.

The purpose of the report is to inform the hospital community about the health status of county and city residents; to help identify gaps in services; and to assist in developing culturally appropriate programs that target appropriate population sub-groups and health conditions.

The report includes socioeconomic and health indicators selected by the group of hospitals. Data have been compiled and analyzed for each city in the county and for regions of the county. Cities are compared to the county, California, national statistics and to Healthy People 2010 national objectives where such comparisons are possible. Comparing characteristics of cities with the County as a whole, other cities and HP2010 illustrates some of the socioeconomic, race/ethnic and geographic health disparities that exist in the county.

The report is organized into chapters addressing the following health indicators:

- Demographic and economic characteristics Age, education, income, language, household income, poverty, unemployment.
- Uninsured Health insurance status.
- Maternal and child health Immunizations, low birth weight, teen births.
- Chronic diseases Prevalence of obesity; mortality from diabetes, coronary heart disease, stroke, lung cancer, colorectal cancer, female breast cancer, and prostate cancer; and hospitalization for asthma.
- Mental disorders Hospitalization for depression, alcohol disorders, and drug disorders.
- Leading causes of death By age and race/ethnicity.
- Injury and homicide Unintentional injury and homicide mortality.

The mission of the Alameda County Public Health Department includes working "in partnership with the community to ensure optimal health and well being of all people." The Public Health Department prepared
this report as part of this mission, and hopes it is a useful reference to support planning and policy efforts of the hospitals to help build healthy communities. The Public Health Department is grateful for the support of the Hospital Council in fulfilling this mission.

## Using the Report

The demographic chapter provides information on key social, population, and economic factors that influence health status. Tables and charts pertaining to the selected health indicators are presented for all cities in Alameda County and discussed in relation to the rest of Bay Area cities. Additional detailed demographic information for each city in Alameda County is provided in the appendices.

Chapters begin with a background section that contains information on the disease or health condition, rates in the population nationally, and in California, if available, and the distribution in the population by sex and race/ethnicity where possible. Following this background, data on Alameda County are presented focusing on the burden of the disease and condition by age and sex. Age-adjusted rates by race/ethnicity and age-adjusted rates at the city level are provided. Tables and charts are presented, detailing the number of events in each city and region, by sex and race/ethnicity separately, and showing rates in these subgroups as numbers permit. Maps depicting geographic distribution are provided for select indicators.

Where possible, the rates by race and ethnicity, age, and sex are presented. Generally, data are presented for the three-year period 2000 to 2002. At the city level, detail on age, sex, and population subgroups is limited because of small numbers. Except for the larger cities, there are often insufficient numbers (deaths, births, hospitalizations) at the subgroup level to calculate rates that can be considered reliable. In this report the small number standard is relaxed from 20 to ten in accordance with recent changes in established guidelines. Rates are presented if there were ten or more events over the period of interest. This allows for presentation of more information for each city than in the past. The appendix contains tables with additional detail such as confidence intervals.

## Geographic measures

Twenty urban areas are covered in this report. These urban areas are 14 incorporated cities (Alameda, Albany, Berkeley, Dublin, Emeryville, Fremont, Hayward, Livermore, Newark, Oakland, Piedmont, Pleasanton, San Leandro, and Union City) and six unincorporated census designated places as defined by the Census Bureau (Ashland, Castro Valley, Cherryland, Fairview, San Lorenzo, and Sunol). These urban areas are frequently grouped and referred to as cities, even though not all are formally incorporated. Each type of data has variations in its geographies (See Technical Appendix).

In addition to the cities, data are presented by county region. Many cities are so small that rates cannot be presented for many indicators. The county regions are large enough that reliable rates are often available; for example, the teen birth rate cannot be presented for Albany but it can be presented for Albany and Berkeley together. The regions are north county (Albany and Berkeley); Oakland area (Oakland, Emeryville, Piedmont, and Alameda); central county (San Leandro, San Lorenzo, Hayward, Castro Valley, Ashland, Cherryland, and Fairview); south county (Fremont, Newark, Union City, and Sunol); and tri-valley (Livermore, Pleasanton, and Dublin).

## Race and ethnicity

This report restricts descriptions of race and ethnicity to short words and phrases. It is recognized that individual preference varies and that classification is not trivial. Considering the report's many text references, tables, and figures that make comparisons between races, readability and space require consistent and abbreviated usage. Thus, the report refers to African American, rather than Black or African. In tables and figures, African American is usually shortened to AfrAmer. Other standard terms are White; American Indian (sometimes shortened to AmerInd); Pacific Islander (sometimes shortened to PacIsl and sometimes referred to as Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander); and Asian (sometimes combined with Pacific Islanders and shortened to API). Latino includes all those of Spanish- and Portuguese-speaking descent in the Americas, including people from Spain. Hispanic or Latino is considered by most data collectors such as the Census Bureau to be an ethnicity rather than a race. Thus, a Latino may be White or Asian or Black, but here all those persons are reported as Latino. Some data systems are allowing people to choose multiple races or simply a Multirace or Other category, so the report uses those designations when needed. Finally, race is often unreported, mis-reported, or unclassifiable in many data systems; the report often includes these for completeness, labeled as appropriate for the circumstance.

In this report, we present mortality and birth data on the Multirace group, but it appears only in the tables. It is not shown in the charts. This is because the data do not accurately reflect the Multirace population, probably in most cases undercounting births and deaths.

## 2 Demographic Proffle

According to the World Health Organization (1988), "health is a state of complete physical, mental, and social well-being and not merely the absence of disease or infirmity."1 To better understand the health status of a city's population, it is important to examine the social, economic and environmental conditions in which people live. Studies have shown that conditions such as income, education, social isolation and unemployment can have a large impact on health. In fact, these conditions can be as important as genetics, biology and access to medical care. ${ }^{2}$

Data on key demographic, social, and economic factors are presented here for each city in the county. Comparisons are made between cities, the entire county, and the rest of the Bay Area.

In Tables 1 and 2, basic demographic data are compared using the "normal distribution" of the Bay Area's individual cities. The Bay Area includes the ten counties in the San Jose-San Francisco-Oakland metropolitan area. Of the 202 cities in these counties, the largest 113 plus Sunol are compared here. Those Alameda County cities outside the middle of the Bay Area distribution are highlighted.

In Table 1, it is seen that Piedmont, Oakland, Ashland, and Cherryland have different profiles than other cities. Piedmont has a high median age and a high percentage of children less than 18 years. Piedmont residents also have high education levels, and a low percentage of households and persons who do not speak English well. Oakland has relatively few persons of 65 years and older. Oakland also has a high percentage of single mothers, a low percentage of persons who have received a high school education, and a high percentage of non-English speakers. Ashland and Cherryland have a profile similar to that of Oakland.

Table 2 compares economic indicators from Census 2000. Here, Berkeley and Emeryville stand out, as well as the previously mentioned cities of Piedmont, Oakland, Ashland, and Cherryland. Berkeley's high student population is reflected in the small household size, low income, a low percentage of households that were owner-occupied, and high poverty. The category, "owner vs. renter household income" gives an idea of income disparity. This disparity is pronounced in Oakland and Berkeley.

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## 3 Uninsured

## Background

The uninsured are those who do not have health insurance coverage through private health insurance plans, including managed care plans, or through Medicaid, Medicare, or other government-sponsored health plans. ${ }^{1}$ Health insurance promotes access to a regular source of care, which is particularly important for those with chronic health problems. Not having health insurance can lead to people delaying care or not seeking it at all, which can lead to later diagnosis and poor management of health problems. ${ }^{2,3}$

According to the UCLA Center for Health Policy Research:
"Covering the uninsured makes financial sense. Health insurance coverage promotes access to a regular source of care and relieves the burden on the public tax dollars that fund safety-net providers. Covering the uninsured also improves the lives of all Californians by creating healthier and more productive learning environments for school children and improving workplaces for adults. Ensuring that all Californians have health care coverage and that the costs of such coverage are spread fairly would reduce the burden on the state budget, an additional fiscal benefit."2

## Prevalence

Nationally, $18 \%$ of adults 18 to 64 years and $12 \%$ of children one to 17 years lack health insurance coverage. In California, $24 \%$ of adults 18 to 64 years and $14 \%$ of children one to 17 years lack health insurance. ${ }^{2,4}$ This translates to over six million children and adults in California who are without health insurance coverage for all or part of the year. ${ }^{2}$

The rate of uninsured in California is thus higher than the national rate and fourth highest of all states. ${ }^{5}$ About two-thirds of California's uninsured children are eligible for Medi-Cal or Healthy Families, and over $10 \%$ of uninsured adults are eligible for Medi-Cal. ${ }^{6}$

More than half of California's population is enrolled in a health maintenance organization (HMO); approximately 17.7 million children and adults in 5.5 million households. This HMO population is extremely
diverse. Fifty-nine percent are White, 19\% are Latino, $12 \%$ are API, $7 \%$ are African American, and 3\% other race/ethnic groups including American Indians. ${ }^{7}$ The ethnic diversity, variety of languages spoken, and varied literacy levels among California's HMO population are potential barriers for HMO members in understanding their plan's policies and programs and obtaining access to services. ${ }^{7}$

## Alameda County

According to the 2001 California Health Interview Survey (CHIS), $11 \%$ of non-elderly adults and 5\% of children in Alameda County were without health insurance coverage. ${ }^{8}$ Table 3 shows the uninsured rate by race/ethnicity in Alameda County. Limited sample sizes in some race/ethnic groups resulted in estimates that may be unreliable. Despite this limitation, the numbers are presented here because they are the best available at the local level.

Rates of uninsured were lower among children than adults because more low-income children were covered by Medi-Cal and other safety net programs. Rates of uninsured adults and children were highest among

## Latinos.

[^1]Results from another survey in 2000 showed substantially higher rates of uninsured than the CHIS. The County of Alameda Uninsured Survey ${ }^{3}$ found that $16 \%$ of adults 19 to 64 years were uninsured. Variations by race/ethnic group were large. By far the highest rates of uninsured were among Latinos; nearly half the adults of Mexican and Central American origin were uninsured.

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## 4 Maternal, Child, and Adolescent Health

This section covers information on childhood immunization levels, reportable childhood communicable diseases, low birth weight births, and teen births.

## Childhood Immunizations

Immunization is among the safest and most effective preventive measures known. Vaccines are the first line of defense against diseases such as polio, measles, pertussis (whooping cough), and hepatitis. Many of these diseases were the leading causes of death for children before the development of the vaccines. Vaccines not only protect the immunized individual, but the community as well. For this reason, California requires that children be checked to see that they are up-to-date on their shots before entering kindergarten, before seventh grade, and before enrolling in licensed childcare programs.

The HP2010 objective is for $90 \%$ of children aged 19 to 35 months to have all universally recommended vaccinations. ${ }^{1}$ Nationally, the rate of vaccine coverage has been increasing and in 2003 was at an all-time high of $82 \%$. In California, vaccine coverage was even higher at $91 \%$ and met the HP2010 objective. ${ }^{2}$

Vaccination rates vary by race, income level, and geography. Nationally, childhood vaccination rates are lower among African Americans and Latinos than they are among Whites and Asians. However, this racial gap has narrowed over time. Children living in poverty have lower vaccination rates. ${ }^{1}$ The Federal Department of Health and Human Services also reports "substantial numbers of under-vaccinated children remain in some areas, particularly the large urban areas with traditionally underserved populations, creating great concern because of the potential for outbreaks of disease". ${ }^{1}$

Each year, the State Department of Health Services conducts the Kindergarten Retrospective Survey to assess the immunization levels of students in kindergarten. School immunization records of kindergarten students five years old are used to estimate the percentage of children who were up-to-date when they were two years old. Therefore, the 2003 survey estimates vaccination coverage for those children when they were two years old in 2000.

The county rate was significantly below the HP2010 objective of $90 \%$. Data from 2003 estimated that only $73 \%$ of Alameda County children were up-to-date on their immunizations at age two (Table 4). This was an improvement from 2000, when the rate was $65 \%$. African American children had the lowest immunization rate at about $60 \% ; 79 \%$ of White and Asian, and about $71 \%$ of Latino children were immunized.

## Vaccine-preventable disease cases

Vaccination is considered one of the ten great public health achievements of the United States in the 20th century. The incidence of many vaccine-preventable diseases is at or close to record-low levels. Cases of pertussis, tetanus (lockjaw), mumps, and rubella (German measles) have been reduced by more than $95 \%$ from peak pre-vaccine levels. Diphtheria, polio, and measles have been effectively eliminated, and smallpox has been eradicated. ${ }^{3}$ Table 5 shows the number of cases of vaccine-preventable disease in children 18 years and younger in Alameda County for the period 2001 to 2003.

Hepatitis B was the most common vaccinepreventable disease among children in

Alameda County, followed by pertussis. In three years, there was only one case of rubella and one case of mumps. There were no cases of measles, diphtheria, tetanus, or polio between 2001 and 2003. There were no deaths due to any vaccine-preventable disease among children.

## Low Birth Weight

The birth weight of an infant is the most important factor in its chances for survival and healthy growth and development. Infants weighing less than 2,500 grams ( 5 lbs 8 oz ) at birth are considered low birth weight (LBW). Those infants that are very low birth weight - weighing less than 1,500 grams - are at the highest risk of dying in their first year of life. LBW infants are at high risk of illness (e.g. physical and developmental complications) and death. Improvements in birth weight could contribute substantially to reducing infant mortality. ${ }^{4}$

In the past decade, infant mortality has declined largely due to improved survival rates of LBW infants, not to a decrease in the percentage of LBW infants. ${ }^{5}$ Many factors increase the risk of low weight at birth; examples include pre-term delivery, maternal smoking, illicit drug use, poor maternal nutrition, young maternal age, late or no prenatal care for the mother, and multiple births (e.g. twins). Smoking leads to $20 \%$ to $30 \%$ of all LBW births in the United States. ${ }^{4}$ Low maternal educational attainment and low family income are associated with higher rates of LBW births. Some research suggests that cumulative stress, racism, and maternal infections affect the birth weight of babies. ${ }^{6}$

LBW rates have not improved in the last decade and no progress

Nationally, LBW rates have in fact slowly increased over time, partially because of an increase in multiple births. In 2000, the percentage of LBW infants was $7.6 \%{ }^{7}$ LBW rates are two times higher for African Americans than for Whites. The reasons for this disparity are complex and are not entirely known. Some of this disparity is explained by the fact that African

Americans are more likely to have those factors associated with LBW, such as low young maternal age, less education, and inadequate prenatal care. ${ }^{5}$ Puerto Ricans are also at increased risk of having LBW infants.

Alameda County was one of the counties with the highest percentage of LBW infants in California in 20002002. The LBW rate in Alameda County was $6.8 \%$ compared to $6.3 \%$ in California. Neither California nor Alameda County met the HP2010 objective of $5.0 \%$ or less. ${ }^{8}$ The highest percentage of LBW births was in Emeryville (8.6\%), Oakland (7.9\%), and San Leandro (7.5\%) (Figure 1). The lowest percentage of LBW births was in Castro Valley (4.7\%), Albany (4.8\%), San Lorenzo (5.3\%), Berkeley (5.5\%), and Piedmont (5.5\%).

There was some variation of LBW rates by race/ethnicity and county region. Overall, African Americans had LBW rates twice that of Whites and Latinos (Table 6). African Americans had the highest rates of LBW infants in all areas except in tri-valley where Asians had a higher rate. Note that the African American LBW rate in tri-valley may be unreliable as it was based on only seven cases over the three-year period. However, the high Asian rate was based on adequate numbers and clearly was unusually high in tri-valley. In contrast, Asians and Whites had lower LBW rates in the north county region than they did in other regions.

## Teen Births

Teen births are considered a serious social problem. The majority of teen pregnancies and births are unplanned. Teen parenthood places both mother and child at risk for a variety of poor health, social, and economic outcomes. Some studies suggest that teen mothers have more difficulty completing their education, have fewer employment opportunities, and are more likely to require public assistance and to live in poverty than their non-parent peers. They also are at high risk for poor birth outcomes and having another pregnancy while still in their teens. ${ }^{9}$ It is not clear from the literature whether the difficulties teen mothers experience are caused by having children at a young age, or were due to preexisting conditions such as poverty. Studies are more conclusive about the negative effects of being raised by a teen mother. Children born to teen mothers are more likely to have behavioral and cognitive problems, be less healthy, be abused, and be placed in foster care. ${ }^{9}$

Many factors either increase the risk of, or are associated with, teen pregnancy: lack of knowledge about and poor access to birth control; poor access to health care; low income; lack of emotional support; lack of education; lack of positive role models; unsatisfactory adult relationships; lack of after-school and community activities; substance abuse; and low self-esteem. ${ }^{10}$

Nationally and statewide, teen birth rates are on the decline. (For all these statistics, teen refers to persons 15 to 19 years, and teen birth rate refers to the number of births per 1,000 females 15 to 19 years.) In the last ten years, California's rate has gone from one of the highest in the nation to below the national average. These declines were in all major race/ethnic groups.

In California, Latinas have the highest teen birth rates, especially foreign-born Latinas. Two out of three babies born to teen mothers are born to Latinas. African Americans and American Indians also have high teen birth rates. In general, Asians have low teen birth rates; however, grouping such a large and varied population together can mask underlying variation. For example, Laotian and Hmong teens have birth rates ten times higher than Chinese and Japanese teens. ${ }^{9}$

Of all births in Alameda County between 2000 and 2002, 7.0\% were to teen mothers aged 15 to 19 years; California's rate was $10.0 \%$. The teen birth rate was 33.6 per 1,000 females, much lower than the rate of 45.0 in California. ${ }^{8}$ Younger teens had fewer births than older teens. Approximately one-third of teen births were to mothers of 15 to 17 years, and two-thirds to mothers 18 and 19 years.

Teen birth rates varied substantially from city to city. Oakland had an exceptionally high rate of 61 per 1,000 teen females (Figure 2). The teen birth rate in Oakland was almost eight times higher than in Pleasanton, which had the lowest rate in the county. Ashland, Cherryland, and Hayward also had high teen birth rates. Alameda County's teen birth rate was driven up in large part by Oakland and Hayward rates, which accounted for

Source: CAPE, with data from Alameda County Vital Statistics, Census 2000, and DOF. $64 \%$ of teen births in the county. Pleasanton, Berkeley, Dublin, and Alameda had teen birth rates less than half of the county average (Map 1).

Cities that had high teen birth rates also had a high percentage of Latinos and African Americans and high poverty rates. Latinos had a teen birth rate six times higher than Asians and Whites (Table 7). African Americans also had a high teen birth rate. About half of the population of Ashland, Cherryland, Hayward, and Oakland was Latino or African American (ranging from 45\% to $57 \%$ of the population) ${ }^{11}$ and these cities had the county's highest teen birth rates.

Oakland has the second highest poverty rate (19\%) in Alameda County and was one of the few cities in which every race/ethnic group had higher teen birth rates than the county. A notable exception to the poverty and teen birth rate association was in Berkeley. Despite having the highest percentage poverty (20\%), the teen birth rate for each race/ethnicity was lower in Berkeley than the county. From these data, it is not possible to know why Berkeley has such low rates - the rates may be due to successful efforts to address teen pregnancy in Berkeley; by an elevated poverty rate associated with the high student population; or some other factor.

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## 5 Chronic Disease

## Prevalence of Obesity

## Background

The number of people in the United States who are either overweight or obese has increased steadily over the past thirty years. More than $60 \%$ of adults are either overweight or obese, as are at least $13 \%$ of children.
Obesity is caused by a complex set of inter-related factors - nutritional, behavioral, and environmental.
Genetic predisposition toward obesity plays a role as well. What is most evident, however, is that the obesity epidemic is due largely to changes in Americans' diet and exercise habits: they eat larger quantities than they used to, they consume higher calorie foods, and they get less physical activity. ${ }^{1}$

The California Adolescent Nutrition and Fitness Program and the California Pan Ethnic Health Network recently issued a briefing paper on obesity in communities of color. In it, the authors summarize the problem succinctly:

While all racial and ethnic groups in the United States saw obesity rates increase in the last three decades, communities of color have experienced the highest and most rapid increases. The chronic disease conditions directly associated with poor nutrition and inactivity, such as diabetes, heart disease, stroke, certain cancers, and high blood pressure, are also on the rise. Among many communities of color and lowincome communities, these rates of chronic disease prevalence are higher than national averages and are increasing at accelerated rates. The consequent toll of illness, disability, and premature death related to these preventable diseases is tremendously high in both personal and economic terms. This pattern of greater and more accelerated rates of increase and higher incidence and prevalence of chronic disease is unfortunately all too familiar. As with many other disease conditions, communities of color and lowincome communities experience severe health disparities when compared to white, mainstream, and moreaffluent communities. This epidemic is an additional burden to communities already under siege by poor health.
...Our current food and activity environments are the result of industry practices and government policies that have converged to perversely promote the behaviors and environmental factors that increase overweight and inactivity. Communities of color are subject to an excess of these environmental risks. Therefore, responding appropriately and aggressively to these growing health disparities is essential to the health of our communities. ${ }^{2}$

## Measuring overweight and obesity

Measurements of height and weight help to assess the overall health and nutritional status of adults. The most common measure used to determine overweight or obesity status is the body mass index (BMI), calculated as weight in pounds multiplied by 703, divided by height in inches squared. ${ }^{3.5}$ Although the BMI ranges are not exact ranges of healthy and unhealthy weight, studies have shown that health risk increases as BMI increases. ${ }^{6}$

## Prevalence among adults

The National Health and Nutrition Examination Survey (NHANES) reported that 30\% of American adults 20 years and older were obese in 1999-2000, compared to $23 \%$ in 1988-1994. Another $34 \%$ of adults in 1999-2000 were overweight. Rates of obesity among women increased from $17 \%$ in 1980 to $34 \%$ in 1999-2000. Among men, rates increased from $13 \%$ to $28 \%$ during the same period. ${ }^{7}$

The most recent NHANES data available on race/ethnicity are for 1988-1994, when rates of obesity among men were similar across race/ethnic groups at about $20 \%$ to $21 \%$. However, $37 \%$ of African American women and $34 \%$ of Mexican-American women were obese, compared to $23 \%$ of White women. ${ }^{7}$

The CDC's Behavioral Risk Factor Surveillance System (BRFSS) has reported estimates that are more conservative, indicating that obesity increased from $12 \%$ in 1991 to $21 \%$ in $2000 .{ }^{8}$ The discrepancy between these national estimates is likely due to methodological differences in how the NHANES and BRFSS are conducted. Participants in the NHANES receive a physical examination, during which their weight and height are objectively measured. The BRFSS, on the other hand, is a phone survey in which respondents report their own weight and height. It is likely that BRFSS respondents tend to under-report their weight.

While the rate of obesity in California is less than the national rate, it is rapidly increasing. BRFSS data shows that obesity in California adults almost doubled from 1991 to 2002, from 10\% to 19\%. Approximately $57 \%$ of adult Californians were either overweight or obese. ${ }^{9,10}$ The 2001 California Health Interview Survey (also a phone survey relying on self-reported weight) reported similar results - $19 \%$ of adults 18 years and older were obese and another $35 \%$ were overweight. ${ }^{11}$ American Indians, African Americans, and Latinos had higher rates of adult obesity ( $30 \%, 29 \%$, and $25 \%$ ) than Whites ( $18 \%$ ). Asians had the lowest rate ( $6 \%$ ). ${ }^{11}$

For Alameda County, the 2001 CHIS data show that $18 \%$ of adults were obese and another $34 \%$ were overweight. ${ }^{11}$ A higher percentage of men than women were overweight but not obese ( $43 \%$ versus $25 \%$ ); however, rates of obesity were similar for men and women (19\% and 17\%). African Americans and Latinos had higher rates of obesity ( $29 \%$ and $23 \%$ ) than Whites (19\%). ${ }^{11}$

## Prevalence among children

For children and adolescents, the CDC defines overweight as at or above the 95th percentile of BMI for age. ${ }^{12-14}$ For children younger than two years, overweight is defined as at or above the 95 th percentile of weight for length. ${ }^{12}$

Being overweight in childhood has been linked to several health problems that can last into adulthood. These include poor heart health (e.g. hypertension, high cholesterol), Type 2 diabetes, and impaired mental health (depression, low self-esteem). Poor self-image from being judged as obese can follow youth into adulthood, "resulting in fewer years of completed education, lower family income, and higher rates of poverty regardless of their initial economic background." ${ }^{15}$

Nationally, the proportion of children and adolescents who are overweight has nearly tripled in the past few decades. In 1999-2000, $16 \%$ of those 12 to 19 years, $15 \%$ of those six to 11 years, $10 \%$ of those two to five years, and $11 \%$ of infants from birth through 23 months were overweight. African American and MexicanAmerican adolescents of 12 to 19 years had the highest proportions of overweight ( $24 \%$ and $23 \%$ ). In comparison, $14 \%$ of Whites were overweight. ${ }^{16-18}$

In 2001 in California, nearly $17 \%$ of adolescents 12 to 19 years were overweight or obese. Again, the rates were higher for African Americans (22\%) and Latinos (20\%) than Whites (14\%). ${ }^{19}$

According to the CHIS, $16 \%$ of Alameda County adolescents of 12 to 19 years were overweight or obese. ${ }^{19}$ CDC's Pediatric Nutrition Surveillance data suggests even higher rates, as in Table 9. ${ }^{20}$

A survey of Alameda, Oakland, and Piedmont produced an even higher estimate. Twenty-seven percent of fifth, seventh, and ninth graders were overweight, including $33 \%$ of boys and $22 \%$ of girls. In addition, the

Source: CDC. survey found that $46 \%$ were physically unfit. ${ }^{21}$

## Diabetes Mortality

## Background

Diabetes mellitus is a chronic disease in which the ability to oxidize carbohydrates is impaired. Simply put, blood glucose (sugar) levels are too high. This is generally due to the body's inability to produce insulin (the hormone produced by the pancreas to regulate blood sugar) or use it properly. There are two main types of diabetes, type 1 and type 2:

Type 1 diabetes was previously called insulin-dependent diabetes mellitus or juvenile-onset diabetes. It develops when the body's immune system destroys pancreatic beta cells, the only cells in the body that make the hormone insulin that regulates blood glucose. This form of diabetes usually strikes children and young adults, although disease onset can occur at any age. Type 1 diabetes may account for $5 \%$ to $10 \%$ of all diagnosed cases of diabetes. Risk factors for type 1 diabetes may include autoimmune, genetic, and environmental factors.

Type 2 diabetes was previously called non-insulin-dependent diabetes mellitus or adult-onset diabetes. Type 2 diabetes may account for about $90 \%$ to $95 \%$ of all diagnosed cases of diabetes. It usually begins as insulin resistance, a disorder in which the cells do not use insulin properly. As the need for insulin rises, the pancreas gradually loses its ability to produce insulin. Type 2 diabetes is associated with older age, obesity, family history of diabetes, history of gestational diabetes, impaired glucose metabolism, physical inactivity, and race/ethnicity. African Americans, Latinos, American Indians, and some Asian Americans and Native Hawaiians or Other Pacific Islanders are at particularly high risk for type 2 diabetes. Type 2 diabetes is increasingly being diagnosed in children and adolescents. ${ }^{1,2}$

Diabetes requires rigorous management to reduce the risk of serious complications and premature death. It contributes to a variety of medical problems, including heart disease, stroke, high blood pressure, blindness, kidney disease, diseases of the nervous system, amputations, dental problems, and complications of pregnancy. Risk factors for diabetes include poor diet, lack of physical activity, and being overweight or obese. ${ }^{1}$ Race/ethnicity, a family history of diabetes, and a history of gestational diabetes are also associated with its incidence.

Diabetes was the sixth leading cause of death in the United States in 2001. ${ }^{3}$ The CDC estimates that over 18 million adults 20 years and older, nearly $9 \%$ of adults, have diabetes. Approximately five million of these have yet to be diagnosed. ${ }^{1,2,4}$ The number of U.S. adults with diagnosed diabetes has increased $61 \%$ since 1991 and is projected to more than double by 2050 . ${ }^{5,6}$

In 2002, about 1.3 million adults 20 years and older were newly diagnosed with diabetes. ${ }^{2,5}$ While diabetes is most common among those 65 years and older, the rate of type 2 diabetes in children and adolescents has been increasing, especially among people of color.?

It is estimated that $14.9 \%$ of adult American Indians have diabetes, $11.4 \%$ of African Americans, $8.2 \%$ of Latinos, and $8.4 \%$ of Whites. ${ }^{7}$ The prevalence of diabetes has increased steadily over the past 20 years, most notably among African Americans. Recent increases have also occurred among Latinos. ${ }^{4,8}$

In 2001, there were 71,372 deaths from diabetes in the United States. The age-adjusted death rate was 25 per $100,000 .{ }^{3}$ The diabetes death rate in California was 21 per 100,000 in 2000-2002. ${ }^{.0}$ However, the statistics on deaths alone do not fully describe the problem. Over 200,000 people die each year of diabetes-related complications. ${ }^{2}$ And, studies have shown that death certificates frequently do not reflect diabetes as a cause of death, or as an underlying cause of death, for those who had diabetes when they died. ${ }^{1,2}$

About 1.5 million or $6 \%$ of Californians 19 years and older have been diagnosed with diabetes. Nearly $35 \%$ of cases are among seniors 65 years and older. Overall, about $10 \%$ of African American and $9 \%$ of American Indian adults have been diagnosed with diabetes in California. The race/ethnic disparity in diabetes is widest among older adults. Among adults 65 years and older, approximately one out of four African Americans and Latinos have been diagnosed with diabetes, at least two times the figure for Whites.9 ${ }^{9,11}$

Adults living at or below $100 \%$ of the federal poverty level (FPL) suffer from diabetes at a higher rate than those with incomes above $300 \%$ FPL ( $7.8 \%$ and $4.5 \%$, respectively). In addition, the rate of diabetes is much higher among adults who never attended high school (10\%) than among college graduates (4\%). ${ }^{11}$

In Alameda County, it is estimated that nearly $6 \%$ of adults 19 years and older have been diagnosed with diabetes. About $30 \%$ of cases are among adults 65 years and older. Approximately $13.4 \%$ of African Americans have been diagnosed with diabetes, compared to $4.5 \%$ of Whites. ${ }^{9}$

## Alameda County

Between 2000 and 2002, 835 Alameda County death certificates listed diabetes as the primary cause of death. This was an average of 278 deaths per year. The age-adjusted diabetes death rate was 22 per 100,000 (Tables 10 and 11). Unfortunately, this rate is not directly comparable to the HP2010 objective of 45 : the objective references diabetes as a contributing cause of death in addition to the primary cause. ${ }^{12}$

Rates of death from diabetes increased with age for both sexes. Male rates exceeded female rates in most age groups (Figure 3). Pacific Islanders had an exceptionally high rate of death from diabetes (Figure 4). However, this rate was based on a small number of deaths ( 11 over three years) and may not be reliable. The diabetes death rate among African Americans was 2.5 times the rate for Asians and Whites. The Latino rate was nearly two times the White rate.

African Americans' risk of death from diabetes exceeded other race/ethnic groups in every age group, most notably in the oldest age group where the rate was 591 per 100,000 (Figure 5).

## Cities

Diabetes death rates were highest in Cherryland, Newark, and San Lorenzo (Figure 6). Rates in Hayward and Oakland were also above the county rate. The cities of Alameda, Livermore, and Pleasanton had the lowest rates, approximately half the rates in the highest cities.

In most cities, the male death rate was only slightly higher than the female rate. However, in Alameda, the male rate was 2.7 times the female rate, in San Leandro it was 1.7 times, and in Union City, it was 1.5 times. Only in Newark was the male rate less than the female rate.

Since many cities are small and had relatively few deaths from any given cause, statistics on subgroups may be unreliable and are therefore not presented for three-year counts less than ten.

African Americans had the highest diabetes death rates in all cities shown, ranging from 42 in Berkeley to 49 in Oakland. Latinos generally had the second highest rates, ranging from 31 in Oakland and Fremont to 42 in Hayward. Rates among Whites ranged widely from eight in Berkeley to 37 in San Lorenzo. The highest Asian rate was 28 in Union City.

With such sparse data on race/ethnic groups, it is not immediately apparent why the Cherryland, Newark, and San Lorenzo rates were so high. Whites in San Lorenzo and Newark had higher rates than Whites in other cities. As Whites make up a large segment of the population in these cities, they may help to elevate the rate.

## Coronary Heart Disease Mortality

## Background

Coronary heart disease (CHD), also called ischemic heart disease, develops when the arteries of the heart become narrowed or clogged and cannot supply enough blood to the heart. These coronary arteries carry oxygen-rich blood and nutrients to the heart muscle. Coronary heart disease usually results from the build up of fatty material and plaque (atherosclerosis) in the inner layer of the walls of the coronary arteries. If the blood supply to the heart muscle is inadequate, a person can experience chest pain or pressure called angina. A heart attack (myocardial infarction) occurs when the blood supply to parts of the heart muscle is cut off completely. ${ }^{1,2}$

Several risk factors for coronary heart disease can be modified through lifestyle changes. The risk of developing CHD can be reduced significantly through a healthy diet, regular exercise, reducing stress level, and not smoking, in addition to reducing or controlling high blood pressure, high blood cholesterol, and diabetes. Socioeconomic status, environment, and culture are also important risk factors in the development of the disease. ${ }^{3.5}$

Deaths from all types of heart disease have declined steadily over the past 50 years, mostly from better medical treatment and effective prevention efforts to reduce controllable risk factors such as hypertension, smoking, high blood cholesterol, and physical inactivity. ${ }^{3}$ Most deaths from heart disease are due to CHD. Other forms of heart disease include hypertensive heart disease and rheumatic heart disease. ${ }^{6}$

CHD is the most common cause of death in the United States, accounting for more than one of every five deaths. About 340,000 people per year die of CHD before ever being hospitalized. Most of these are sudden deaths caused by cardiac arrest. ${ }^{7}$

It is estimated that 13.2 million people in the United States, over 6\%, have CHD. In 2001, the age-adjusted death rate nationally was 178 per 100,000 population. ${ }^{7}$ In California it was 186 for the period 2000-2002. ${ }^{8}$ Both rates exceed the HP2010 objective of 166 or fewer CHD deaths per 100,000. ${ }^{3}$

From 1991 to 2001, the U.S. death rate from CHD declined $26 \%$. More than $80 \%$ of people who die of CHD are 65 years and older. Approximately 11.5 years of life are lost on average due to heart attack. ${ }^{7}$ African American males have the highest rates of death from CHD (262 per 100,000), followed by White males (228), African American females (177), and White females (137). ${ }^{7}$

CHD occurs more often in men than in women. In the past, CHD rarely affected women prior to menopause, but that is no longer the case, perhaps because many women now take oral contraceptives, smoke cigarettes,
and are employed in stressful jobs that used to be held exclusively by men. Post-menopausal women have two to three times the risk of CHD than pre-menopausal women of the same age. ${ }^{6}$

Coronary heart disease is the leading cause of premature and permanent disability among U.S. workers, and accounts for $19 \%$ of social security's disability allowances. ${ }^{6,7,9}$ About two-thirds of heart attack patients do not make a complete recovery, but $88 \%$ of those less than 65 years are able to return to their usual work. ${ }^{6}$

## Alameda County

From 2000 to 2002, 6,466 Alameda County residents died from CHD, an average of 2,155 deaths per year. The age-adjusted CHD death rate was 174 per 100,000 (Tables 12 and 13). This rate exceeds the HP2010 objective of 166 , but it is lower than the state or national rate.

The Alameda County CHD death rate was nearly $50 \%$ higher among males than among females. Very few deaths from CHD occur at less than 45 years. Beyond age 45, the risk of death from coronary heart disease increases sharply with age (Figure 7). Males had higher age-specific rates than females in each age group, though at 85 years and older the difference was minimal.

The CHD death rate among Pacific Islanders was 344 per 100,000, significantly higher than all other race/ethnic groups (Figure 8). (Note that this rate may be unreliable as it was based on 39 deaths over the three-year period.) The rate among African Americans also substantially exceeded that of other race/ethnic groups. American Indians, Asians, and Latinos met the HP2010 objective of 166.

African Americans had higher age-specific CHD death rates than the other race/ethnic groups in each age group, except for those 85 years and older (Figure 9). The age-specific death rates for Whites were lower than those for African Americans before the age group 85 and older, when it increased sharply.

## Cities

Cherryland had the highest CHD death rate in the county, followed by Alameda and Hayward (Figure 10). These cities, in addition to Fairview, Livermore, and Oakland had CHD death rates substantially higher than the HP2010 objective of 166. Piedmont and Albany had the lowest rates in the county (Map 2).

In nearly all cities, males had a higher risk of dying from CHD than females. The male rate in Albany was 2.5 times the female rate; it was 1.9 in Piedmont, and 1.7 in San Leandro and Castro Valley.

With few exceptions, the highest CHD death rates in each city were among African Americans followed by Whites and Latinos. The highest African American rates were in Fremont (331), Alameda (306), and Union City (294). African American rates in every city for which a rate was calculated were well above the HP2010 objective of 166. Cherryland had the highest White CHD death rate in the county, followed by Hayward, Alameda, and Newark. All were above 200.

The highest Latino rates were in Alameda (199) and Union City (170); all others were below the HP2010 objective. The highest Asian rate, and the only one that exceeded the Health People 2010 objective, was in Castro Valley (174). The CHD death rate was exceptionally high (558) for Pacific Islanders in Hayward.

Hayward was the only individual city with numbers sufficient to calculate such a rate, but it may be unreliable as it was based on 11 deaths over a three-year period.

## Stroke Mortality

## Background

A stroke or cerebrovascular accident occurs when the blood supply to the brain is cut off or when a blood vessel bursts. Within a few minutes of being deprived of oxygen, brain cells begin to die. Death or permanent disability can result.

There are two main types of stroke: ischemic and hemorrhagic. Most strokes are of the ischemic type. Ischemic stroke is caused by blockage in an artery that supplies blood to the brain, resulting in a deficiency in blood flow. Ischemic stroke develops in major blood vessels on the brain's surface or in small blood vessels deep in the brain. During ischemic stroke, diminished blood flow initiates a series of events (called ischemic cascade) that may result in additional, delayed damage to brain cells. Early emergency medical intervention helps to lessen damage to the brain and subsequent disability. ${ }^{1,2}$

Hemorrhagic stroke starts with the rupture of a blood vessel in the brain. Bleeding from the rupture compresses nearby blood vessels, depriving surrounding tissue of oxygen and causing stroke. Hemorrhagic stroke usually affects a large area of the brain, many times leading to death. ${ }^{1,2}$ Hypertension is the most common cause of hemorrhagic stroke. Strokes in young adults tend to be hemorrhagic.

Stroke is the third leading cause of death in the United States. It also is a leading cause of serious, long-term disability. About 700,000 people experience a new or recurrent stroke each year. Death rates from stroke have declined steadily since the early part of the twentieth century. ${ }^{3.6}$ From 1991 to 2001 the U.S. death rate from stroke declined $3.4 \%$, but the actual number of deaths rose $7.7 \% .{ }^{4}$

Nationally, the age-adjusted rate of death from stroke in 2001 was 58 per 100,000 population. ${ }^{7}$ The male rate was 59 and the female rate was 56 . The California rates are slightly higher: 59 overall, 63 for males, and 60 for females. ${ }^{9}$ All these rates exceeded the HP2010 objective of $48 .{ }^{5}$ Because women live longer than men, more women than men die of stroke each year. Women accounted for $61 \%$ of U.S. stroke deaths in 2001. ${ }^{3,4}$

Of all race/ethnic groups, African American males and females have the highest rates of death from stroke (85 and 74 per 100,000 ), followed by White males and females (57 and 55). ${ }^{4}$ The African American rate in California was 86, higher than the national rate of 79. Each are higher than their respective White rates, 60 in California and 56 nationally. ${ }^{9}$

High blood pressure, diabetes, smoking, and having had a previous stroke or heart attack increase a person's chances of having a stroke. Maintaining healthy blood pressure through diet, exercise, and medication, if necessary, can decrease the risk for stroke. ${ }^{1,5}$

## Alameda County

From 2000 to 2002, there were 2,456 deaths due to stroke among Alameda County residents, an average of 819 per year. The age-adjusted rate of stroke death was 66 per 100,000 per year (Tables 14 and 15). This rate exceeds the state and national rate, as well as the HP2010 objective of 48 .

The stroke death rate was only slightly higher among males than females in Alameda County ( 68 vs. 64). Despite the higher rate of stroke among males, only $39 \%$ of those who died from stroke were males. The larger numbers of women dying from stroke reflect the larger number of women alive at older age groups when the risk of death from stroke is greater.

At age 45 and older, the risk of death from stroke increased sharply with age for both men and women. Rates for males and females were similar at all ages (Figure 11).

The stroke death rate for Pacific Islanders was 110, substantially higher than any other race/ethnic group. This rate may be unreliable as it was based on only 14 deaths over the three-year period. However, since a high risk of death from CHD and diabetes has also been observed in this group, it is unlikely that these high rates were due to random variation. African Americans also had very high stroke death rates (Figure12).

African Americans had higher age-specific death rates than other race/ethnic groups in every age group. Rates in each race/ethnic group increased dramatically in the age group 85 and older but the increase was less pronounced for Latinos (Figure 13).

## Cities

The age-adjusted stroke death rate was highest in Oakland, San Lorenzo, and Cherryland (Figure 14). Rates in most cities of Alameda County far exceeded the HP2010 objective of 48 per 100,000. The rates for Piedmont, Albany, Ashland, Fairview, and Newark were among the lowest, ranging from 45 to 48.

In most cities with numbers sufficient to calculate rates, male rates exceeded female rates by $10 \%$ to $50 \%$. In a few cities - Pleasanton, San Leandro, and Union City - female rates were higher than male rates.

Rates of stroke death were highest among African Americans. Berkeley, Hayward and Oakland, the only cities for which African American rates are shown, have rates nearly two or more times the HP2010 objective. Asian rates ranged from 38 in San Leandro to 78 in Newark. Latino rates ranged from 46 in San Leandro to 84 in Castro Valley, and White rates ranged from 37 in Newark to 85 in Cherryland and Union City.

## Cancer Background

Cancer is a large group of diseases in which abnormal cells divide uncontrolled. Cancer cells differ from normal cells in size and in function, and are characterized by uncontrolled growth and spread of abnormal cells throughout the body rapidly and independently from the primary site to other tissues. They can spread, or metastasize, to other locations via the bloodstream, the lymphatic system, or by accidental transplantation from one site to another during surgery. Cancer is broadly classified according to histologic origin: carcinomas - those derived from cells found in the lining of various tissues, and sarcomas - those derived from the underlying supporting tissue. ${ }^{1,2}$

Nationally, there were 553,768 deaths from cancer in 2001. Cancer is the second leading cause of death in the United States, accounting for $23 \%$ of all deaths. The age-adjusted death rate in 2001 was 196 per 100,000. ${ }^{3}$

According to the National Cancer Institute, cancer incidence rates for all cancer sites combined increased from the mid-1970s through 1992, decreased through 1995, then stabilized through $2000 .{ }^{4}$ This is due in part to the fact that increases in breast cancer in women and prostate cancer in men offset a long-term decrease in lung cancer in men. ${ }^{4,5}$

Death rates for all cancer decreased beginning in 1994 and stabilized from 1998 through 2000. Recent data show that death rates among men continued to decline throughout the 1990s, whereas death rates among women were essentially unchanged from 1998 through 2000. ${ }^{4}$

In general, incidence and death rates for all cancers combined are lower among Asian/Pacific Islander, American Indian, and Latino populations than among White and African American populations. African Americans are more likely to die of cancer than any other racial/ethnic group. An examination of national figures for four major cancer sites revealed growing disparities between White and African American populations. ${ }^{3-6}$

African American males have a higher incidence of lung, prostate, and colorectal cancer than White males. They are also more likely to die from these diseases. The rate of new breast cancer cases among White females is higher than among African American females, yet African American females are more likely to die from breast cancer (Table 16).

Latinos have higher rates of cervical, esophageal, gallbladder, and stomach cancers than non-Hispanic Whites. Rates of stomach and liver cancers are higher among Asian Americans than the rest of the population, and the rate of colorectal cancer is highest among Alaskan Natives. ${ }^{6}$ Although the rates of cancer incidence and death have declined recently, the actual number of people diagnosed with cancer is expected to double in the next
several decades, as the elderly population grows. ${ }^{7}$ Adequate access to cancer screening and the availability of high quality treatment among poor and underserved populations are critical to reducing the burden of cancer. ${ }^{18}$

Many cancers can be cured if detected early and treated promptly, and many can be prevented by lifestyle changes. Maintaining a healthy weight, exercising regularly, and not smoking, can reduce an individual's risk of cancer substantially. ${ }^{9}$ Cancer prevention and control plans should not only address specific screening methods in specific populations, but also should devote resources to the development and dissemination of public health programs that promote and help people maintain a healthy lifestyle.

## Lung Cancer Mortality

Lung cancer is the leading cause of death from cancer in the United States for both men and women, accounting for $28 \%$ of all cancer deaths. More than 156,000 people in the U.S. died of lung cancer in 2001. ${ }^{4}$ The American Cancer Society estimates that more than 173,770 new cases of lung cancer will be diagnosed in the United States in 2004. ${ }^{19}$ Although there has been some progress in methods of cancer treatment, the chances of full recovery after treatment are very low. Only about $14 \%$ of those treated for lung cancer survive five or more years. ${ }^{10}$

Nationally, the age-adjusted lung cancer death rate in 2001 was 55 deaths per 100,000 population. ${ }^{4}$ In California, it was 45 for the period 2000-2002. ${ }^{11}$ Both the national and state rates exceed the Healthy People 2010 objective of 44.9 or fewer lung cancer deaths per 100,000. While lung cancer death rates have declined since 1990 among males, they have continued to increase among females. Since 1987, more females have died from lung cancer than from breast cancer. Age-adjusted lung cancer death rates are approximately 40 percent higher among African American males than White males. ${ }^{6}$

According to the American Cancer Society, a single behavior - cigarette smoking - is thought to be responsible for eight out of ten cases of lung cancer. In addition, non-smokers who breathe the smoke of
others also have an increased risk of developing lung cancer. Thus, preventing and reducing cigarette smoking are key to reducing illness and death from lung cancer. ${ }^{10}$

## Alameda County

From 2000 to 2002, there were 1,841 lung cancer deaths among Alameda County residents, an average of 614 deaths per year. The age-adjusted lung cancer death rate was 49.3 per 100,000 population (Tables 17 and 18). This rate exceeds the Healthy People 2010 objective of 44.9 or fewer lung cancer deaths per $100,000 .{ }^{6}$ The rate is above the California rate and below the national rate.

Rates of death from lung cancer increased sharply with age, particularly among males, until 85 years when it leveled off or declined. Male rates exceeded female rates in all age groups (Figure 15).

African Americans had a very high lung cancer death rate, well above the other race/ethnic groups (Figure 16). It was at least two times Asian and Latino rates. The White rate was more than twice the Latino rate. For the county as a whole only Asians and Latinos met the HP2010 objective of 44.9.

African Americans had the highest rates of lung cancer death in each age group until age 85 and older when it dropped off dramatically (Figure 17). The pattern is similar for Whites, but with a sharper increase between the 55-64 age group and the 65-74 age group. Also, there was only a small decline in the oldest age group. Latinos and Asians have the lowest rates in each age group marked by a far more gradual increase in rates with age than that seen for African Americans and Whites.

## Cities

The age-adjusted lung cancer death rate was highest in Newark, Ashland, and San Lorenzo (Figure 18). These cities exceeded the HP2010 objective of 44.9 by a wide margin. In fact, most cities in Alameda County exceeded the national objective. Only Dublin, Berkeley, and Fairview have rates below the objective.

In most cities with numbers sufficient to calculate rates, the male death rates were higher than the female rates by at least $50 \%$. In Newark, the male rate was 2.7 times (170\%) higher than the female rate. In Berkeley, Castro Valley and Oakland the male rates were more than $80 \%$ higher.

African Americans had the highest lung cancer death rates in all cities shown, ranging from 53 per 100,000 in Berkeley to 82 in Oakland. Whites generally had the second highest rates, ranging widely from 29 per 100,000 in Berkeley and Dublin to 90 in Ashland and 84 in Newark. Rates among Asians ranged from 26 per 100,000 in Alameda City to 55 in San Leandro.

## Colorectal Cancer Mortality

Colorectal cancer is a malignant neoplasm in the colon and rectum. Symptoms for colorectal cancer may include rectal bleeding, abdominal discomfort, pain, bloating, a change in bowel habits, iron deficiency anemia, and unexplained weight loss. ${ }^{1,2}$ Most colorectal cancers develop over many years from benign polyps. Precancerous polyps can be detected and removed during certain screening procedures, thereby preventing colorectal cancer. If colorectal cancer is found early and treated appropriately, the chance of survival is greatly enhanced. ${ }^{12-15}$

Colorectal cancer is the second leading cause of cancer-related death in the United States and it is the third most common cancer in men and women. ${ }^{12,15,16}$ It is estimated that approximately 146,940 new colorectal cancer cases will be diagnosed in 2004 and that 56,730 Americans will die of colorectal cancer in 2004. ${ }^{19}$

Nationally, the age-adjusted colorectal cancer death rate in 2001 was 20.1 deaths per 100,000. ${ }^{3,4}$ In California, the rate was 18.1 per 100,000 during the period $1997-2001 .{ }^{17}$ Both the national and state rates exceed the HP2010 objective of 13.9 .

The risk of developing colorectal cancer increases with advancing age. Most cases are diagnosed in those 50 years and older. The risk is also higher among people with inflammatory bowel disease (ulcerative colitis or Crohn's disease), a family history of colorectal cancer or colorectal polyps, and certain hereditary syndromes. Lack of regular physical activity, low fruit and vegetable intake, a low-fiber and high-fat diet, obesity, alcohol consumption, and tobacco use are associated with colon cancer. ${ }^{1,12}$

All adults 50 years and older should be screened routinely for colorectal cancer. Studies have found that at least $75 \%$ of colorectal cancers occur among people with no family or personal history of colorectal cancer and no risk factors that would place them at high risk for developing colorectal cancer. ${ }^{12-15}$

## Alameda County

From 2000 to 2002, there were 696 colorectal cancer deaths among Alameda County residents, an average of 232 deaths per year. The age-adjusted colorectal cancer death rate was 18.5 per 100,000 population (Tables 19 and 20), exceeding the HP2010 objective of 13.9. ${ }^{6}$

Rates of death from colorectal cancer increased sharply with age for both sexes. Male rates exceeded female rates in most of age groups except in the age groups 45-54 and 85 and older (Figure 19).

African American colorectal cancer death rate was higher than any other race/ethnic group, nearly twice the Latino rate. At the county level, only Latinos met the HP2010 objective of 13.9 (Figure 20).

While rates in all race/ethnic groups increased with age, the increase was more gradual for Latinos than others (Figure 21). A large increase was seen for African Americans in the 75-84 age group. In the age group 85 and older, rates among Asians, African Americans and Whites were similar, approximately $60 \%$ to $70 \%$ higher than the Latino rate.

## Cities

Colorectal cancer death rates were highest in Newark and Ashland, followed by Pleasanton and San Lorenzo (Figure 22). Only in Fremont and Livermore did rates approach the HP2010 objective of 13.9 or fewer colorectal cancer deaths per 100,000.

In most cities with numbers sufficient to calculate rates, male death rates were higher than the female rates by at least $20 \%$ to $50 \%$. In Berkeley, Hayward, Livermore, and Union City, rates for males and females were about the same.

Asians in Berkeley had the highest colorectal cancer death rate found in Alameda County ( 35 per 100,000). Relatively high rates were also found among African Americans in Berkeley and Oakland. The highest White rate was found in Newark. The Berkeley and Newark rates are based on small numbers and may be unreliable.

## Female Breast Cancer Mortality

Female breast cancer is a disease in which cancer cells are found in the tissues of the breast. In its early stages, the cancer cells stay in the breast as a tiny nodule or lump. In later stages, some cells from the lump spread to other parts of the body and cause tumors to grow in these new sites. While breast cancer can occur in men, women comprise the vast majority of breast cancer cases.

Breast cancer is the second leading cause of cancer death among women and the most commonly diagnosed cancer among women in the United States. Women at high risk of developing breast cancer include those who: have a family history of breast cancer, have never been pregnant, were first pregnant after age 31, have had endometrial, ovarian, or unilateral breast cancer, or were exposed to low level ionizing radiation. Exposure to radiation, estrogen therapy, and diet are also associated with breast cancer. ${ }^{1,2,18}$

In 2001, breast cancer killed 41,394 women in the United States. The age-adjusted death rate from breast cancer among U.S. women was 26 per 100,000. At the national level, breast cancer death rates are $35 \%$ higher among African American women (34) than among White women (26). ${ }^{3}$ In California, the breast cancer death rate is 24 per 100,000 women. ${ }^{11}$ Both the national and state rates exceed the HP2010 objective of 22.3 per 100,000 women. ${ }^{6}$

Seventy percent of all diagnosed cases of breast cancer are among women 50 years or older. The American Cancer Society estimates that 215,990 American women will be diagnosed with breast cancer in 2004. ${ }^{19}$

Since 1990, the breast cancer death rate has decreased among White females. For African Americans, the decline did not begin until the mid-1990s. Among Latinas and Asians, rates appear to have leveled off since the mid-1990s without declining. These race/ethnic differences may be due in part to the fact that breast cancer is diagnosed at earlier stages in White women than in women of color, affecting chances of survival. ${ }^{4,6,16}$

Early detection of breast cancer requires a combination of regular self-breast examination, clinical breast examination, and mammography. It is estimated that timely mammography screening among women older than 40 years could prevent $15 \%$ to $30 \%$ of all deaths from breast cancer. ${ }^{18}$

## Alameda County

From 2000 to 2002, there were 567 breast cancer deaths among women in Alameda County, an average of 189 deaths per year. The age-adjusted breast cancer death rate was 25.7 per 100,000 women (Tables 21 and 22), exceeding the HP2010 objective of 22.3 per $100,000 .{ }^{6}$

After the age of 25, rates of death from breast cancer increased with advancing age (Figure 23). Those age 85 years and older had the highest breast cancer death rate ( 157 per 100,000 women).

African American women had a very high breast cancer death rate, well above the other race/ethnic groups (Figure 24). At the county level, only Asian and Latina rates were below the HP2010 objective of 22.3.

African American women had notably higher rates than others in each age group except in the 65-74 and 7584 age groups (Figure 25). Under age 65, Asians and Latinas had the lowest rates. Latina rates increased in the 75-84 age group to the level of Whites and African Americans. In the age group 85 and older, African American and White rates continued to climb while Latina rates declined.

## Cities

The age-adjusted breast cancer death rates were highest in Berkeley, Castro Valley, and Newark (Figure 26). Except for Union City, rates in all other cities in the county exceeded the HP2010 objective of 22.3. Rates ranged from 20.6 per 100,000 in Union City to 33.3 in Berkeley. Fremont and Livermore rates were very close to meeting the objective.

Berkeley African Americans had the highest breast cancer death rate of any race/ethnic group in all cities. The rate was almost two times that for Whites in Berkeley. It is noteworthy that Berkeley's African American rate was also almost two times Oakland's African American rate. Berkeley's rate is based on relatively small numbers (19 over three years) and therefore may not be reliable. Whites in Newark and Union City had higher breast cancer death rates than Whites in other cities. The lowest rates were among Asians in Fremont and Oakland.

## Prostate Cancer Mortality

Prostate cancer is a malignant neoplasm that develops in the prostate gland, the walnut-sized gland deep in the pelvis, between the bladder and the penis. The prostate, which wraps around the urethra, produces the fluid part of semen, which carries sperm. Most prostate cancer develops in the posterior part of the prostate gland, and the rest near the urethra. Prostate cancer is a slow-growing cancer that rarely produces symptoms until it is well advanced. ${ }^{1,2}$

Prostate cancer is the second leading cause of cancer-related death among men in the United States, as well as the most commonly diagnosed cancer among men. The American Cancer Society estimates that in 2004, there will be 230,110 new cases of prostate cancer. ${ }^{19,20}$

Nationally, the age-adjusted prostate cancer death rate in 2001 was 29 deaths per 100,000 men; 30,719 men died from the disease. ${ }^{3}$ About $70 \%$ of prostate cancers are diagnosed among elderly men who are 65 years or older. ${ }^{20}$ In California, the age-adjusted prostate cancer death rate was 28 per 100,000 during the period 19972001. ${ }^{17}$ Both national and state rates are close to the Healthy People 2010 objective of 28.8 per 100,000 men. ${ }^{6}$

Since 1990 there has been a gradual decline in the prostate cancer death rate among all race/ethnic groups monitored. This trend is more notable among Whites than among African Americans. ${ }^{5,16,20}$ The death rates for African American men continue to be two times higher than those for White men. In 2001, the prostate cancer death rate was 27 for White men compared to 66 for African American men. ${ }^{3}$

The declining trend might be explained by technological advances in medicine and early screening for prostate cancer known as prostate-specific antigen (PSA) testing. ${ }^{16,20}$ From a public health perspective, the effectiveness of PSA screening in reducing mortality has not yet been clearly demonstrated because the test produces a large number of false positives. ${ }^{20}$

## Alameda County

From 2000 to 2002, there were 411 deaths from prostate cancer in Alameda County, an average of 137 deaths per year. The age-adjusted prostate cancer death rate was 29.7 per 100,000 men (Tables 23 and 24). This rate is only slightly above the HP2010 objective of 28.8 per 100,000. ${ }^{6}$

After age 54, the death rate from prostate cancer increased sharply with advancing age. The rate among men 85 years and older was very high, 640 per 100,000 (Figure 27).

African American men had a very high prostate cancer death rate, 63.4 per 100,000, two to three times higher than other race/ethnic groups (Figure 28). For the county, only Asians and Latinos have met the HP2010 objective of less than 28.8, though White men are close to it.

Prostate cancer death rates among African American men were about two times higher than White men in each age group (Figure 29).

## Cities

The age-adjusted prostate cancer death rates were highest in Oakland and San Lorenzo (Figure 30). These cities, in addition to Berkeley and Castro Valley had rates exceeding the HP2010 objective of 28.8. All other cities for which data are available have met the objective. Overall, rates ranged from 22.8 in Hayward to 38.0 in Oakland.

African Americans in Berkeley had the highest prostate cancer death rate (75.1) of any group shown. The rate is more than three times the White rate in Berkeley. The death rate among African Americans in Oakland was 65.0, two times the White.

The death rate among Whites in San Lorenzo was higher than Whites in any other city (42.8). White rates in Alameda, Castro Valley, Fremont, Oakland, and San Lorenzo exceeded the HP2010 objective of 28.8.

## Asthma

## Background

Asthma is a chronic lung condition that causes swelling, excess mucus, and narrowing of the airways. An asthma attack occurs when the airways become so swollen and clogged that the person has trouble getting enough breath. Symptoms include coughing, wheezing, shortness of breath, and a tight feeling in the chest. Asthma can be triggered by exposures and conditions such as respiratory infections, dust mites, animal dander, mold, pollen, tobacco smoke, wood smoke, indoor and outdoor air pollutants, and even exercise. ${ }^{1}$ Although the exact cause of asthma is not known, the development of asthma is determined by the interaction between genetics and environmental exposures. In Alameda County, air pollution is prominent, especially in areas with major freeways and industrial facilities.

There is no cure for asthma, so effective management of the condition is essential. Effective management of asthma involves: 1) controlling exposure to asthma triggers; 2) adequately managing asthma with medications; 3) monitoring lung function; and 4) educating asthma patients to work with medical providers as partners in their own care. ${ }^{1}$

The prevalence of asthma has been increasing nationally since 1980. The CDC estimates that 14 million people in the United States have asthma and that over ten million have had an asthma attack in the past year. In general, asthma rates are higher among females and children five to 14 years. African Americans and lowincome residents of inner cities have higher rates of asthma. ${ }^{2}$

Nationally, there are approximately 460,000 asthma hospitalizations per year. Rates of asthma hospitalization are highest among children under five years, followed by children five to 14 years and then adults 65 years and older. Hospitalization rates are 1.5 times higher among females than males and three times higher among African Americans than Whites. In 1999, the rate of emergency room visits for asthma was three times higher among African Americans than Whites. ${ }^{2}$

Data from the Behavioral Risk Factor Surveillance System showed that approximately 7\% of U.S. adults currently have asthma. ${ }^{2}$ Asthma rates were highest among Multirace respondents ( $16 \%$ ), followed by American Indians (12\%), African Americans (9\%), Whites (8\%), Latinos (5\%), Asians (3\%), and Pacific Islanders (1\%). ${ }^{3}$ In California, an estimated 7\% of adults currently have asthma, $5 \%$ of women and $9 \%$ of men. ${ }^{4}$

There are 5,000 deaths nationally per year from asthma. The death rate for African Americans is 2.5 times that for Whites, and about 1.5 times higher among females than males. Asthma death rates increase with age. ${ }^{2}$

## Childhood asthma

Chronic conditions such as asthma can adversely affect the physical, cognitive, social, and emotional development of young children. According to The Health of Young Children in California, ${ }^{5}$ asthma is the most common health condition among young children. Approximately $10.5 \%$ of California children one to five years have been diagnosed with asthma. The highest rates are for African American children (20.4\%), followed by White (10.4\%) and Latino (9.2\%) children. While about half the children diagnosed with asthma take medication to control it, it is believed that many more experience symptoms and physical limitations and should be taking controller medication. In addition, it is estimated that $22 \%$ of children diagnosed with asthma have an asthma-related ER visit each year. The figure jumps to $34 \%$ among those one and two years old with asthma. The largest contributor to preventable hospital admissions among children is usually asthma. ${ }^{5}$

Asthma hospitalization rates in Alameda County exceed California rates in every demographic group studied. For children, and the population as a whole, Alameda County rates were the second highest among the state's 58 counties, after Imperial County. Alameda County has the highest asthma hospitalization rates in the state among African American children 14 years and younger. ${ }^{6}$

In California, asthma hospitalization rates are highest among African Americans even when adjusted for income. Statewide and nationally, rates among African Americans are at least three times those for Whites. ${ }^{7}$

There are many reasons that some demographic groups are more likely to suffer from asthma. According to a recent Oakland/Berkeley Asthma Coalition report, ${ }^{8}$ key factors include:

Poverty People with asthma living in poverty have limited access to health care, medications, and transportation. They also have fewer housing options, live in some of the poorest neighborhoods, and frequently rent units in sub-standard buildings with mold, cockroaches and other pest infestation that contribute to their asthma burden.

Environmental inequities Parts of Alameda County have rates of childhood asthma hospitalization exceeding the national Healthy People 2000 objective by two or more times. These areas are more heavily impacted by industry that releases a multitude of pollutants into the air; they experience the heaviest traffic flow in our cities along the I-80 and I-880 corridors - especially diesel truck traffic, which releases more irritants than other vehicle emissions - and they are predominantly populated by people of color.

Limited health care access Many people with asthma have limited or no access to health care. They are significantly less likely to receive the regular care from a medical provider that is essential for the successful management of a chronic condition like asthma. They are also less likely to have prescriptions for daily controller medications, or a medical provider that speaks their language. Effective asthma management requires an ongoing commitment from the patient and provider to work as a team.

Systematic racial differences Studies have shown that people of color are less likely than whites to receive proper medications and medical care for a variety of chronic health conditions. Intentional or not, these systematic differences in medical care may well result in poorer health outcomes for people of color.

## Alameda County

Here asthma is looked at as both a contributing factor and as a primary factor for hospitalizations. Also, hospitalizations are examined for children 14 years and younger and for the population as a whole.

Rates of hospitalization with asthma as a contributing factor increased with age (Figure 31). Among the elderly, the most common principal diagnoses were heart disease (20\%), respiratory disorders other than asthma ( $18 \%$ ), and digestive system disorders ( $11 \%$ ). Among youth, the most common principal diagnoses were respiratory disorders other than asthma (32\%) and mental disorders (21\%).

Children five years and younger in Alameda County had very high asthma hospitalization rates (Figure 32). Male children in this group were hospitalized at twice the rate of females ( 896 per 100,000 compared to 480 ). The HP2010 objective for the 0-5 age group is 250 per 100,000. Female rates began to exceed male rates in the 15-24 age group. Between 35 and 75 years, females were hospitalized at twice the rate of males.

With the exception of Asians, rates of asthma hospitalization were highest in the 0-5 age group (Figure 33). Rates were exceedingly high among African American children under 15 years, three to five times higher than other groups. African American rates, though they declined in young- and early-adulthood, continued to exceed those in other race/ethnic groups through the 55-64 age group. In general, asthma hospitalization rates increased among the elderly. The rate among Asian/Pacific Islanders increased in old age to its peak in the 85 and older age group, while the African American rate decreased.

Among children under age 15 years in Alameda County, there were 3,396 hospitalizations between 2000 and 2002, an average of 1,132 per year. The age-adjusted rate was 367.1 per 100,000 children (Tables 25 and 26). The asthma hospitalization rate for African American children under age 15 was seven times that for Asian/Pacific Islander children, five times that of Whites, and four times that of Latinos (Figure 34).

## Cities

Oakland's rate of childhood asthma hospitalization was very high ( 721 per 100,000 children under 15 years). The second highest rate was in Berkeley (460) (Figure 35). Alameda County's relatively high rate was driven in large part by Oakland and Berkeley. The lowest rates were in Dublin, Pleasanton, and Fremont (Map 3).

In all cities, asthma hospitalizations among male children exceeded those among females. In Alameda, Newark, and San Lorenzo, male rates were at least two times female rates.

In all cities where the number of hospitalizations was sufficient to calculate rates, the rates for African American children were two to six times those of other race/ethnic groups. African American rates ranged widely across cities, from a low of 300 per 100,000 in Fremont to a high of 1,200 in Berkeley. Asian/Pacific Islander children had the lowest asthma hospitalization rates in every city but San Leandro, where Latino rates were lowest. Rates among Whites were lower than among Latinos except in Fremont, Hayward, San Leandro, and San Lorenzo.

The high asthma hospitalization rates in Oakland and Berkeley are likely due to a combination of environmental and socioeconomic factors. Environmental exposures such as air pollution and substandard housing tend to be near freeways, ubiquitous in Oakland and West Berkeley. The poor are more likely to live in areas with these exposures. Living in poverty poses greater challenges for asthma management and access to primary care.

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## 6 Mental Disorders

## Mental IIIness

The Surgeon General defines mental health as "the successful performance of mental function, resulting in productive activities, fulfilling relationships with other people, and the ability to adapt to change and to cope with adversity; from early childhood until late life, mental health is the springboard of thinking and communication skills, learning, emotional growth, resilience, and self-esteem." ${ }^{1}$

The Surgeon General defines mental illness as mental disorders collectively: "Mental disorders are health conditions that are characterized by alterations in thinking, mood, or behavior (or some combination thereof) associated with distress and/or impaired functioning."1

Approximately $21 \%$ of adults and children annually suffer from some kind of mental disorder in the United States. According to the Surgeon General, in the general population there is surprisingly little variation across race/ethnic groups with regard to the prevalence of mental disorders. ${ }^{2}$ This conclusion, however, was based on data from community household surveys and those respondents we think of as 'the general population.'

There is ample information showing that people of color bear a disproportionate burden of the causes and consequences of mental disorders relative to Whites. Mental disorders are far more prevalent among those who are homeless, sheltered, institutionalized, or incarcerated than in the larger community. Since people of color are over-represented in these and other vulnerable populations, they have a greater need for mental health services. ${ }^{2}$

In addition, the Surgeon General finds that people of color have more limited access to mental health services: they are less likely to receive needed services even when they are available; they often receive a lower quality of care; and they are underrepresented in mental health research. ${ }^{2}$

For anyone attempting to access quality mental health services, barriers to care are cost, availability, fragmentation of services, and the stigma associated with mental illness. Additionally, people of color often
deal with racism and discrimination, language, communication and cultural barriers, and mistrust of their providers. ${ }^{30}$ Finally, less access to care and lower quality of care result in less effective treatment for mental disorders and a disproportionate burden of disability and lost productivity. ${ }^{2}$

Mental illness is the second leading cause of disability and premature mortality, after cardiovascular disease, in the United States and other industrialized economies. ${ }^{1}$ Several categories of mental disorders - depression, bipolar disorders, schizophrenia, and anxiety disorders - are considered serious mental illnesses because of the magnitude of disability associated with them, their prevalence in the population, and the far-reaching effect the illnesses have on families and others who are close. ${ }^{3,4}$ The economic costs are enormous when treatment costs, lost productivity from disability and premature death, and criminal justice system costs are considered.

## Depression

The most common mental disorder is depression. ${ }^{5}$ Some depression is part of the normal life course, and nearly all adults feel depressed at one time or another. This type of depression is typically time-limited and less pervasive than a diagnosable depressive disorder.

Major depression and similar mood disorders usually result in impaired functioning on a variety of levels social, occupational, educational, and familial. Severely depressed individuals often feel empty, worthless, hopeless, and frequently cannot find pleasure in any activities. Suicide can be the result of untreated major depression. ${ }^{31}$

Rates of depression among women are about two times higher than those among men. Men, however, tend to manifest depression differently from women. Men are more likely to get discouraged, angry, or irritable and less likely to seek treatment or be diagnosed. ${ }^{4}$ Nationally, over $6 \%$ of women and $3 \%$ of men experience major depression in a given year. ${ }^{3}$

About one in five adults experience a mental disorder each year. Of these, about $15 \%$ have a co-occurring drug or alcohol use disorder. This coexistence makes treatment of either disorder more complicated. While treatment that addresses both problems at once is thought to be optimal, such options are often unavailable in community settings. ${ }^{1}$ Treatments for mental disorders are becoming increasingly effective. They take two basic forms: psychosocial (psychotherapy or counseling) and psychopharmacologic (medication). Nevertheless, it is estimated that nearly half of U.S. adults with a serious mental illness do not seek treatment. ${ }^{21}$

## Alameda County

In Alameda County, there were 26,908 hospitalizations for mental disorders between 2000 and 2002 (data not shown; see Appendix Table B-7). These mental disorders include the serious mental illnesses as well as
addiction disorders, eating disorders, and various types of dementia (usually associated with aging). The yearly age-adjusted rate of hospitalization for mental disorders for 2000 to 2002 was 609 per 100,000. Over one-quarter of these hospital admissions were for a major depressive disorder.

Between ages five and 24, hospitalization for depression as primary diagnosis accounted for the majority of depression-related hospitalizations (Figure 36). People 45 years and older were more likely to be hospitalized with depression as an associated, or contributing condition, than with depression as the primary condition. This finding was consistent with the fact that rates of depression among the elderly were much higher among those who had a physical health problem (12\%) than among those who do not (1\%). ${ }^{3}$

Among those hospitalized with depression as an associated disorder, the primary diagnoses were: other mental disorders (20\%), injuries (13\%), respiratory system disorders ( $10 \%$ ), and circulatory system disorders (9\%). There were some differences by age. For those under 25 years with depression as an associated diagnosis, $51 \%$ also had another mental disorder as a primary diagnosis compared to only $8 \%$ of those 55 years and older. Injury as a primary cause was also more common in the younger group (20\%) compared to the older ( $10 \%$ ). Conversely, among the elderly hospitalized with depression as an associated diagnosis, respiratory disorders and heart disease were common primary diagnoses ( $14 \%$ and $11 \%$ ) while they were rare among those under age 25 ( $3 \%$ and $<1 \%$ ).

There were 7,404 hospitalizations in 2000 to 2002 in Alameda County with depression as the primary diagnosis, an average of 2,468 per year. The age-adjusted rate of hospitalization for major depression in Alameda County was 170 per 100,000 (Tables 27 and 28). Female rates exceeded male rates in every age group (Figure 37). The highest rates were among females 85 years and older and those females ages 15 to 24 .

Whites and African Americans had the highest rates of hospitalization for major depression at all ages (Figure 38). Among youth and the elderly, White rates were higher than African American rates. Except in the 15-24 age group, African American rates were higher than White rates up to the age of 45. Asian/Pacific Islander rates were relatively low across the age spectrum. Latino rates followed a pattern similar to Whites but were consistently one-half to one-third the magnitude.

At the county level, Whites and African Americans had the highest rates of hospitalization, overall, for major depression, two to five times the other race/ethnic groups. Latino rates were well above Asian/Pacific Islander and American Indian rates (Figure 39).

## Cities

Rates were highest in Livermore and Pleasanton, nearly twice those in Union City and Fremont (Figure 40). Female rates were higher than male rates in every city. In Livermore and Pleasanton, female rates were over 2.5 times male rates. In Alameda, San Lorenzo, and Union City, female rates were twice male rates. The extremely high depression hospitalization rates among females in Livermore and Pleasanton may have been responsible for the cities' high rank overall. Male rates in those two cities did not stand out relative to the other cities. In general, female rates may be higher than male rates because females are more likely to seek treatment.

Across cities, either Whites or African Americans had the highest rates, with wide variations in the differences. For instance, in Union City the African American depression hospitalization rate was 164 compared to a Whites rate of 291, while in Berkeley the African American rate was 319 compared to a White rate of 185 .

## Alcohol and Drug Disorders

As previously stated, addiction disorders are more common among those with serious mental illness than among those without. In Alameda County, $24 \%$ of those hospitalized for a serious mental illness (major depression, schizophrenia, bipolar disorder, anxiety disorders) had an associated alcohol or drug disorder. When the focus was narrowed to major depression, the proportion went up to $28 \%$.

Also, as previously discussed, the co-morbidity of addiction disorders and other serious mental illnesses presents a more complicated treatment picture. While it is not always clear which disorder tends to come first, it has been noted that children and teens with mental illness often do not become substance abusers until after their mental illness manifests. ${ }^{3}$ Awareness of such sequencing suggests a good opportunity for substance abuse prevention efforts among children with mental illness.

Those with addiction disorders often have problems with more than one controlled substance. Fourteen percent of those hospitalized with a primary diagnosis of alcohol disorder in Alameda County had an associated drug disorder. Similarly, $20 \%$ of those hospitalized for a drug disorder had an associated alcohol disorder.

## Alameda County

Associated diagnoses Rates of alcohol and drug disorders as contributing conditions to hospitalization were six times those for primary conditions (Figures 41 and 46). Rates of alcohol disorder as a contributing factor were highest between 35 and 84 years, and rates of drug disorder as a contributing factor were highest between 15 and 64 years. The burden of drug-related conditions falls on youth and young adults to a greater extent than do alcohol-related conditions.

Primary diagnoses From 2000 to 2002, there were 3,757 alcohol disorder hospitalizations in Alameda County, an average of 1,252 per year. The age-adjusted rate of hospitalizations for primary alcohol disorders was 85.1 per 100,000 (Tables 29 and 30). For the same period, there were 2,621 drug disorder hospitalizations in Alameda County, an average of 874 per year. The age-adjusted rate was 58.0 per 100,000 (Tables 31 and 32).

The age and sex patterns of hospitalization for primary alcohol disorders were very different from those for primary drug disorders (Figures 42 and 47). Hospitalizations due to alcohol disorders were more common among middle-aged adults, while hospitalizations due to drug disorders were more common among youth and young adults. Hospitalization rates for alcohol disorders were two to three times higher among men than women. The peak age for alcohol hospitalization for men was 45 to 54 years; for women, rates were stable for the three age groups between 35 and 64 years.

Sex differences were much less pronounced for the drug disorder hospitalizations (Figure 47). The peak age group for men was 35-54 and for women it was 35-44.

Under 45 years of age, Whites had the highest rates of alcohol disorder hospitalization, while after 45 years of age rates were highest among African Americans (Figure 43). Latino rates peaked in the 45-54 age group, as did rates for African Americans and Whites.

For all but Asians, rates of drug disorder hospitalization were highest below 55 years (Figure 48). African American rates peaked in the 45-54 age group, and White rates peaked in the 15-24 age group. Latino rates were variable over the age spectrum but consistently lower than those for African Americans and Whites. Asian rates peaked in the 85 and older age group.

Overall, Whites and African Americans in Alameda County were hospitalized for primary alcohol disorders at far higher rates than other race/ethnic groups (Figure 44). Latino rates were lower but still twice the American Indian rate and six times the Asian/Pacific Islander rate. Only among African Americans did the rate of hospitalization for drug disorders exceed the rate for primary alcohol disorders (Figure 49). There were almost no American Indian drug disorder hospitalizations in the county over the three-year period.

## Cities

Oakland and Hayward had the highest rates of alcohol disorder hospitalization in the county, followed by Newark, Alameda, and San Leandro (Figure 45). Union City had the lowest rate in the county, less than half the rates of Oakland and Hayward. The rate of hospitalization for drug disorders was highest in Oakland (Figure 50). Rates in Albany and Berkeley also exceeded the Alameda County rate of 58 per 100,000. As with alcohol disorders, Union City had the lowest rate, followed by Dublin, Fremont, and Livermore.

For most cities, male alcohol hospitalization rates were twice the female rates. Exceptions were Alameda, Castro Valley, and Union City, with a difference of three times, and San Lorenzo four times. With regard to alcohol disorders, in San Leandro the African American rate was one-third the White rate, and in Hayward it was less than half the White rate. In contrast, African American rates in Berkeley were 70\% higher than White rates. In Oakland, as in the county as a whole, the African American and White rates were nearly the same. Where numbers were sufficient to calculate rates, those of Asian/Pacific Islanders were consistently the lowest. Latino rates, in general, fell in between African American and White rates.

In Dublin and Castro Valley, female rates of hospitalizations for drug disorders were higher than male rates. In all other cities except Fremont, rates for men were higher than those for women. The greatest differences were in San Lorenzo, Albany, and San Leandro, where male rates were $60 \%$ to $80 \%$ higher than female rates.

For drug hospitalizations, the numbers were too small in many cities to compute rates by race/ethnicity. Where calculable, rates for Asian/Pacific Islanders were consistently the lowest. Latino rates were up to three times Asian/Pacific Islander rates. In Oakland and Berkeley, African American rates were twice as high as White rates; in Fremont and Hayward, White rates exceeded African American rates.

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## 7 Leading Causes of Death

Today, five chronic diseases account for over two-thirds of all deaths in the United States - heart disease, cancer, stroke, chronic lower respiratory disease, and diabetes. Heart disease and cancer combined account for more than half of all deaths. ${ }^{1}$

Research has linked chronic disease to a number of causes, particularly unhealthy behaviors. Among the behaviors most clearly associated with chronic diseases are tobacco and alcohol use, poor diet, and lack of exercise. In turn, health behaviors are strongly influenced by social factors, such as income, education level, stress, workplace conditions, violence, and exposure to environmental toxins. ${ }^{2}$

In the United States the three leading causes of death - heart disease, cancer, and stroke - have decreased in the past ten years. ${ }^{3.4}$ Recent declines in many leading causes of death reflect the influence of healthier life styles, greater use of preventive care, public health efforts, and advances in medicine. ${ }^{3,5-8}$ Despite these successes, the rates of some diseases have continued to increase. For example, the number of U.S. adults with diagnosed diabetes has increased $61 \%$ since $1991 .{ }^{9}$

Cause-of-death ranked according to the number of deaths is a useful way to examine the relative burden of mortality from specific causes. From the standpoint of prevention, it is helpful to understand the most common causes of death and how they vary in different age and race/ethnic subgroups.

## Alameda County

The three most common causes of death were heart disease, cancer, and stroke in Alameda County in 20002002 (Table 33). These three chronic diseases accounted for $60 \%$ of all deaths.

As people get older the leading causes of death shift from injuries to chronic diseases. Among those one to 24 years in Alameda County in 2000-2002, unintentional injuries and homicide accounted for over half the total deaths. Among those 25 to 44 years, the leading causes of death included a mix of injuries and chronic

diseases: cancer ( $17 \%$ ), unintentional injuries ( $17 \%$ ), and heart disease ( $12 \%$ ). For those 45 to 64 years, the three leading causes were cancer ( $35 \%$ ), heart disease ( $22 \%$ ), and stroke ( $5 \%$ ). For people 65 years and older, heart diseases accounted for one-third of deaths, and cancer and stroke combined accounted for another onethird.

Heart disease, cancer, and stroke were the leading causes of death for all race/ethnic groups except American Indians. For American Indians, chronic liver disease and cirrhosis was the third leading cause. For Asians, though the three leading causes were the same, the ranking was different: cancer ranked first and heart disease second.

Diabetes was among the five leading causes of death for African Americans, Latinos, and Pacific Islanders. For African Americans, homicide was the fifth leading cause of death. Unintentional injury was among the five leading causes of death among Asians, Latinos, Pacific Islanders, and those of Multirace.

Oakland stands out from the other cities with respect to homicide. In Oakland, homicide was the leading cause of death among people one to 44 years. In the county, homicide ranked second for those one to 24 years but did not rank in the top three for those 25 to 44 years. (See complete tables in Appendix B for leading causes of death for each city by age and race.)

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## 8 Injury and Homicide

## Unintentional Injury

Unintentional injury is bodily harm that is not purposely inflicted. Nationally, two-thirds of injury deaths are unintentional, and 94\% of nonfatal injuries treated in emergency departments are unintentional. ${ }^{1,2}$ About 28 million unintentional injuries were treated in hospital emergency departments in 2000. ${ }^{4}$

Unintentional injuries are one of the major causes of premature death and lifelong disability. Most unintentional injuries are predictable and preventable. Motor vehicle accidents are the primary source of unintentional injury death, followed by falls, poisoning, drowning, and fire. ${ }^{3}$ Falls cause the greatest number of unintentional, nonfatal injuries treated in emergency departments. The next greatest numbers of these injuries result from being struck by or against an object, motor vehicle accidents, overexertion, and cuts. ${ }^{2}$

About two-thirds of poisoning deaths were unintentional, and $93 \%$ of unintentional poisonings were related to drugs. Narcotics were responsible in half of all unintentional poisonings. ${ }^{1}$

In 2001, 101,537 people died of unintentional injuries. Nearly two-thirds of those were male. ${ }^{3}$ The ageadjusted rate of unintentional injury death in the United States was 36 per 100,000 in 2001. The rate among males was 50 , over twice the female rate of $23 .{ }^{3}$ The death rates for males between 18 and 64 years were two to four times the rates for females. Those persons over 70 years had the highest death rates. ${ }^{1}$

Unintentional injuries were the fifth leading cause of death in the United States in 2001. For those under 35 years, they were the leading cause of death as they have been for the last 50 years. ${ }^{1,7}$ In California, the rate of unintentional injury deaths was 28 per 100,000. ${ }^{5}$ Both the national and state rates exceed the HP2010 objective of 17.5 or less. ${ }^{6}$ However, the death rate for unintentional injury has been declining since $1970 .{ }^{8}$

American Indians have disproportionately high rates of death from unintentional injury. Rural or isolated living, minimal emergency medical services, and great distances from sophisticated trauma care contribute to these increased rates. ${ }^{6}$

## Alameda County

From 2000 to 2002, there were 1,007 deaths due to unintentional injury among Alameda County residents, an average of 336 per year. The age-adjusted rate of unintentional injury death was 23.7 per 100,000 (Tables 34 and 35). This rate exceeds the HP2010 objective of 17.5 or fewer deaths per 100,000.

Rates of unintentional injury death were higher among males than females in every age group (Figure 51). The risk of dying from unintentional injury increased greatly after 74 years of age. Death rates among those 85 years and older were extremely high (males 240 ; females 137). In the 15-24 age group, the death rate was more than four times higher for males than females.

The unintentional injury death rate for African Americans was 36.0 per 100,000, higher than any other race/ethnic group, almost twice the rate of Asians (Figure 52).

Below age 65, Asians had the lowest risk of dying from unintentional injuries (Figure 53). However, the Asian rate increased sharply among the elderly and was higher than other race/ethnic groups for those 75 years and older. Interestingly, while African Americans had the higher risk of dying from unintentional injuries from youth through middle age, their death rate in the 85 and older age group leveled off and was no greater than that in the 75-84 age group.

## Cities

The age-adjusted unintentional injury death rate was highest in Ashland, and Oakland (Figure 54). Pleasanton, Fremont, Dublin, and Alameda met the HP2010 objective of 17.5 or less.

Overall, in Alameda County, the rate of unintentional injury death was over two times higher among males than females ( 33.8 per 100,000 compared to 14.7), similar to the national pattern. In most cities with numbers sufficient to calculate rates, male unintentional injury death rates were at least two times female rates.

African Americans in Berkeley and Oakland had the highest rates of unintentional injury death in the county, exceeding the HP2010 objective of 17.5 by more than two times. Rates among Whites in San Leandro, San Lorenzo, and Hayward were very high relative to Whites in most other cities. Only Asians in Fremont and Whites in Alameda and Pleasanton (and essentially Whites in Dublin) meet the HP2010 objective.

## Homicide

Homicide is any intentionally inflicted fatal injury to another person. These exclude deaths caused by law enforcement officers in the line of duty.

Nationally, the age-adjusted rate of homicide was 7.1 per 100,000 in 2001. The homicide rate among males was 10.8, more than three times the female rate of 3.3.3 (These figures include the victims of September 11, 2001.) In California, the homicide rate was 6.5 per 100,000 for the period 2000-2002. ${ }^{5}$ Both national and state rates exceed the HP2010 objective of 3.0 or less. ${ }^{6}$

In 2001, there were 20,308 known homicide victims in the United States; more than $75 \%$ were male. Homicide was the second leading cause of death, after unintentional injury, for the 15-24 and 25-34 age groups. ${ }^{7}$

Homicide victimization was especially high among African American males, exceeding the White male rate by more than five times. ${ }^{3}$ Among African American males 15 to 24 years, homicide was the leading cause of death, accounting for $47 \%$ of deaths in that age group. ${ }^{7}$

Nationally, homicide rates among children and young adults increased between 1960 and the mid-1990s, and have been declining since. ${ }^{8}$ Fifty-six percent of homicides involve firearms. ${ }^{1}$

## Alameda County

From 2000 to 2002, there were 368 homicides among Alameda County residents, an average of 123 per year. The age-adjusted rate of homicide was 7.9 per 100,000 (Tables 36 and 37), over two times higher than the HP2010 objective 3.0 or less.

Rates of homicide were highest in the 15-24 age group for both males and females (Figure 55). Rates declined throughout middle age and increased again slightly between ages 65 and 84. In the 15-24 and 25-34 age groups, the homicide rate was at least six times higher among males than females. These two age groups accounted for two-thirds of total homicides in the county.

The homicide rate for African Americans was 36.9 per 100,000, many times higher than any other race/ethnic group (Figure 56). The rate among Whites and Asians met the HP2010 objective of 3.0 or less.

Between 15 and 54 years, homicide rates among African Americans were extremely high (Figure 57). In the 15-24 age group, the African American rate was 97.5 per 100,000, or nearly one in every thousand young people. The risk of death from homicide continued to be elevated for African Americans through age 74. Homicides among Whites were very low in comparison, peaking at 5.0 per 100,000 in the 25-34 age group.

## Cities

The age-adjusted homicide rate was exceedingly high in Oakland, 18.9 per 100,000, well above the rates of other cities and six times higher than the HP2010 objective of 3.0 (Figure 58). Only Fremont and Berkeley had met this objective.

For Alameda County, the age-adjusted homicide rate was five times higher among males than females. In most cities, the numbers of homicide victims were very small, too small for rate calculations. The homicide rate among males in Oakland was nearly seven times the female rate.

## Injury Deaths by Mechanism and Intent

The injury mortality matrix presents injury data by both mechanism and intent using the external cause of death coding scheme. The matrix is developed by the Injury Control and Emergency Health Services (ICEHS) section of the American Public Health Association and the International Collaborative Effort (ICE) on Injury Statistics. ${ }^{1}$ It is a standard framework for presentation of injury mortality statistics. The mechanism describes the vector such as fall, motor vehicle crash, and poisoning. The intent of the injury describes whether the injury is inflicted purposefully or not. If purposefully inflicted, it describes whether the injury is self-inflicted or inflicted by another person. ${ }^{1}$ Nationally, the leading mechanisms of injury death - motor vehicle crashes, firearms, poisonings, falls, and suffocation - accounted for $78 \%$ of these deaths.

## Alameda County

More than half of injury deaths from 2000 to 2002 were unintentional (57.4\%) (Table 38). An additional $20.9 \%$ of injury deaths were due to homicides, $19.7 \%$ from suicides, and $1.9 \%$ from other causes. Transportrelated injury, primarily involving motor vehicle crashes, was the leading mechanism of unintentional injury death. Motor vehicle crashes accounted for one-third of unintentional injury deaths. The second leading mechanism was poisoning (26.7\%), followed by falls (16.0\%), drowning (3.8\%), and suffocation (3.5\%).

Guns were involved in the majority of homicides (78.0\%). A smaller number of homicides involved stabbing, striking, or suffocation. Guns were used in $42.9 \%$ of suicides. Most others involved suffocation and poisoning, while a smaller number were from cuts, drowning, and falls.

## Injury intent by city

Unintentional injuries accounted for more than half of the injury deaths in almost all cities in the county. Only in Oakland, Cherryland, and San Leandro are homicides more common than suicides. In other cities, suicides accounted for $20 \%$ to $30 \%$ of injury deaths (Table 39).

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# Appendix A: Technical Notes 

## Methods

## Geographic measures

Twenty urban areas are covered in this report. These urban areas are 14 incorporated cities (Alameda, Albany, Berkeley, Dublin, Emeryville, Fremont, Hayward, Livermore, Newark, Oakland, Piedmont, Pleasanton, San Leandro, and Union City) and six unincorporated census designated places as defined by the Census Bureau (Ashland, Castro Valley, Cherryland, Fairview, San Lorenzo, and Sunol). These urban areas are frequently grouped and referred to as cities, even though not all are formally incorporated. Each type of data has variations in its geographies:

- Vital statistics These data are based on address of residence and reflect a precise physical location. This is very different from the 2001 version of this report, where city equivalents were developed by grouping Census tracts.
- Census 2000 Data are reported for each city as a whole.
- Hospitalizations Fifteen city equivalents are developed by grouping zip codes.

In addition to the cities, data are presented by county region. Many cities are so small that rates cannot be presented for many indicators. The county regions are large enough that reliable rates are always available; for example, the teen birth rate cannot be presented for Albany but it can be presented for Albany and Berkeley together. The regions are north county (Albany and Berkeley); Oakland area (Oakland, Emeryville, Piedmont, and Alameda); central county (San Leandro, San Lorenzo, Hayward, Castro Valley, Ashland, Cherryland, and Fairview); south county (Fremont, Newark, Union City, and Sunol); and tri-valley (Livermore, Pleasanton, and Dublin).

## Race and ethnicity

This report restricts descriptions of race and ethnicity to short words and phrases. It is recognized that individual preference varies and that classification is not trivial. Considering the report's many text references, tables, and figures that make comparisons between races, readability and space require consistent and abbreviated usage. Thus, the report refers to African American, rather than Black or African. In tables and figures, African American is usually shortened to AfrAmer. Other standard terms are White; American Indian (sometimes shortened to AmerInd); Pacific Islander (sometimes shortened to PacIsl and sometimes referred to as Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander); and Asian (sometimes combined with Pacific Islanders and shortened to API). Latino includes all those of Spanish- and Portuguese-speaking descent in the Americas, including people from Spain. Hispanic or Latino is considered by most data collectors such as the Census Bureau to be an ethnicity rather than a race. Thus, a Latino may be White or Asian or Black, but here all those persons are reported as Latino. Some data systems are allowing people to choose multiple races or simply a Multirace or Other category, so the report uses those designations when needed. Finally, race is often unreported, mis-reported, or unclassifiable in many data systems; the report often includes these for completeness, labeled as appropriate for the circumstance.

## Rate calculations

Health indicators in this report are presented primarily as age-adjusted rates per 100,000 population. These rates are age-adjusted by the direct method to the U.S. 2000 standard population as described in Technical Notes. Age-adjustment is a summary measure that allows for comparison of rates across population groups that have different age compositions.

Grouping multiple years of data becomes necessary when investigating patterns of health in small geographic areas. This method increases the number of incidents (cases of births, deaths, or hospitalizations), allowing the calculation of more reliable rates and reducing random variation. Rates are not shown if the number of events was less than ten. This limits, for example, the data presented for American Indians by city, or the availability of data for small geographies such as Ashland and Castro Valley.

## Data Sources

Demographic and socioeconomic U.S. Bureau of the Census, American Fact Finder, 2000 Census and 1990 Census.

Population estimates The population estimate for each geography is from Census 2000 and California Department of Finance (DOF) estimates. Since most data are for 2000 to 2002, they have a midpoint of July 1, 2001. Age, sex, and race distributions are from Census 2000 (assuming that little had changed since the Census of April 1, 2000), but the total population is adjusted using the DOF May 2004 benchmark.

Births Alameda County Public Health Department Vital Statistics Files obtained from the Automated Vital Statistics System (AVSS), 2000 to 2002.

Deaths Alameda County Public Health Department Vital Statistics Files obtained from the Automated Vital Statistics System (AVSS) and the State of California merged death file, 2000 to 2002.

Hospital discharge Hospital inpatient discharge data collected by the California Office of Statewide Health Planning and Development (OSHPD), 2000-2002.

Childhood immunization Childhood immunization data was obtained from California State Department of Health Services, Immunization Branch.

Prevalence of uninsured and obesity California Health Interview Survey, 2001, University of California, Los Angeles, Center for Health Policy Studies.

## Limitations of Data and Other Data Issues

Hospital discharge data Because persons with multiple hospitalizations during the year can be counted more than once, hospital discharge data produces the estimates for discharges, not persons. Changes in rates of hospitalization may be attributed to changes in hospital admission practices or the diagnostic coding of illnesses, or reflective of true changes in the patterns of disease. Hospitalization data capture those illnesses or injuries serious enough to get people admitted to the hospital and are not a direct reflection of the prevalence of a given disease or condition in the population since many who have the illness are not hospitalized. Race and ethnicity data are missing for many cases due to the omission of a race field on many hospital discharge forms. Reportedly, race is not recorded in about $18 \%$ of hospital discharge records. ${ }^{1}$ Therefore, there are a large number of cases of 'unknown' and 'other' values which are not included in rate calculations, resulting in an overestimation of rates for some racial groups and an underestimation for others.

Births Information on the newborn is taken from the birth certificate. The race/ethnicity on the birth certificate is reported by self-identification according to the race and ethnicity of the mother.

Deaths The race and ethnicity of the decedent is from the death certificate as reported by family members to the funeral director. However, birth and census population data use the self-reported race of the respondent. Because of the combined effect of numerator and denominator biases, it has been estimated that death rates are overestimated by about $1 \%$ among Whites and $5 \%$ among African Americans. They are underestimated by approximately $21 \%$ for American Indian or Alaska Natives, $11 \%$ for Asian and Pacific Islanders, and $2 \%$ for Latinos. ${ }^{2}$

Change of International Classification of Disease Mortality data for specific causes of death in this report are classified and coded according to the World Health Organization's (WHO) tenth revision of the International Classification of Diseases (ICD-10) implemented in the United States in $1999 .{ }^{3}$ However, the mortality trend data for 1990 to 1998, and hospital discharge data are based on the ninth revision of the International Classification of Diseases (ICD-9). Since the beginning of the century, the International Classification of Disease (ICD) for mortality has been modified about once every 10years, except for the 20-year interval between the last two revisions, ICD-9 and ICD-10. ICD-10 differs from ICD-9 in many respects:

- ICD-10 is far more detailed than ICD-9, about8,000 categories compared with 4,000 categories, mainly to provide more clinical detail for morbidity applications.
- ICD-10 uses 4-digit alphanumeric codes compared with 4-digit numeric codes in ICD-9.
- Three additional chapters have been added, some chapters rearranged, cause of death titles have been changed, and conditions have been regrouped.
- Some coding rules have been changed. ${ }^{4}$

Introducing this tenth revision of International Classification of Disease creates discontinuities in time series and trends. This means the Healthy People 2010 objectives may not be strictly comparable with the tracking data for 1999 and subsequent years whose baseline data were 1997 and $1998 .{ }^{4}$

Multiple race coding The data on race in Census 2000 are not directly comparable to those collected in previous censuses. The October 1997 revised standards issued by the U.S. Office of Management and Budget (OMB) led to changes in the question on race for Census 2000. In Census 2000, respondents were allowed to select more than one category for race. Also, the "Asian and Pacific Islander" category was separated in to two categories, "Asian" and "Native Hawaiian and Other Pacific Islander."

Leading causes of death Causes are ranked according to the number of deaths because it most accurately reflects the frequency of cause-specific mortality. In this report, leading causes of death were derived from the
recommended list of 50 rank-able causes from the 113 selected causes of death developed for use with ICD10. ${ }^{5}$ Leading causes of infant mortality were derived from a separate ranking procedure using the recommended list of 71 rank-able causes from the 130 selected causes of infant death developed in accordance with ICD-10. Ranking leading causes of death is a useful tool for illustrating the relative burden of causespecific mortality. However, the rankings do not necessarily indicate those causes of death of greatest public health importance. Some causes of death of public health importance, such as lung cancer and motor vehicle crashes are excluded from the ranking procedure and included in broader rank-able categories, namely, all cancer and unintentional injuries, respectively. If they were included separately, both causes would rank among the ten leading causes of death. ${ }^{5}$

## Rates

Age-adjustment All age-adjusted rates in this report are adjusted by the direct method to the 2000 U.S. Standard Population. In general, the number of deaths for specific causes of mortality in a community is affected by the size and age composition of the population. Because the risk of dying is primarily a function of age, simply calculating a crude rate for vital events such as death (number of deaths/population) can lead to misleading conclusions when comparing different subpopulations. This is because populations with a large component of elderly people tend to have a high death rate simply because the risk of dying is determined mostly by age. In order to nullify the effect of differences in the age composition of populations, disease rates can be age-adjusted. Age-adjusting methodology involves first calculating rates for each age category to determine age-specific rates. Each age-specific rate is then multiplied by the proportion of the corresponding age category in a standard population. The sum of these weighted age-specific rates in a community is the ageadjusted rate for that community. Age-adjusted disease rates form a better basis for an unbiased comparison across populations.

Variability of rates All vital statistics, including death rates, are subject to random variation. This variation is inversely related to the number of events (e.g. deaths) used to calculate the rate. The smaller the number of events, the greater the likelihood of random variation. In order to protect against providing misleading information based on statistically unreliable rates, the National Center for Health Statistics (NCHS) recommends presenting only rates based on 20 or more events. ${ }^{7}$ For this report, this standard has been relaxed to a requisite ten or more events for rates, a standard recently adopted by the Family Health Outcomes Project of the University of California, SanFrancisco. ${ }^{8}$

Confidence interval A good measure of the reliability of a rate is the confidence interval (CI) around the rate estimate. A confidence interval defines the range of rates that would be determined by repeated sampling of the same phenomenon. By statistical convention, a $95 \%$ confidence interval is considered a useful measure of the range of accuracy of an estimate. This means that with repeated sampling, one would obtain a rate within the confidence interval $95 \%$ of the time. These calculations follow the formulae:

Based on recommendations of the National Center for Health Statistics (NCHS) regarding the calculation of rates and confidence intervals, the standard error of any rate based on fewer than 100 events is based on the Poisson distribution. The Poisson distribution is similar to the binomial distribution but is characterized by very small numbers of events occurring ( p ) in a large number of trials ( n ). ${ }^{9}$
