
Pacific Islander Health Fact Sheet for Alameda County

Pacific Islanders are a relatively small, diverse, and fast-growing population in Alameda County. In sociodemographic and health indicators, Pacific Islanders are often grouped together with Asians and seen as being part of a "model minority" group that is universally healthy, wealthy, and highly educated.¹ Due to API (Asian and Pacific Islander) data aggregation and this "model minority" myth, the health disparities/inequities faced by Pacific Islanders often go unrecognized and under-addressed. This fact sheet highlights the unique characteristics and health concerns of Pacific Islanders in Alameda County.


Socio-demographics

- Pacific Islanders are the fastest-growing population in Alameda County, with a 41% increase in Pacific Islander residents from 2000 to 2010.²
- Pacific Islanders made up 0.8% of the Alameda County population in 2010, with just under **12,000** residents identifying as Pacific Islander.²
- 13% of Pacific Islanders live in poverty, a rate similar to that of the total population in Alameda County.³ The poverty rate differs for different Pacific Islander groups, with 26% of Samoans living in poverty.⁴

• Hayward and Oakland have the largest number of Pacific Islander residents. Over half (53%) of Pacific Islanders live in Hayward (36%) or Oakland (17%).



Pacific Islanders in Alameda County⁶


- There are many Pacific Islands (see map on final page). In Alameda County, the majority of Pacific Islanders are Fijian, Tongan, Samoan, Guamanian/ Chamorro and Hawaiian.
- 19% of Pacific Islanders have less than a high school degree. Demonstrating the differences within the Pacific Islander population, 12% of Samoans and 41% of Tongans have less than a high school degree.⁴
- The **unemployment rate** is 29% for Tongans and 17% for Samoans in Alameda County. When all groups are combined, the Pacific Islander unemployment rate is 17%.⁴

Overall Health

The five leading causes of death for Pacific Islanders in Alameda County are as follows:⁸


- 1. Heart disease
- 2. Cancer
- 3. Diabetes
- 4. Stroke
- 5. Chronic lower respiratory disease
- The five leading causes of death among Pacific Islanders account for 67% of Pacific Islander deaths in Alameda County. These are all chronic diseases that are **largely preventable**.⁹
- Pacific Islander children have the highest obesity rates in the county, with 31% of Pacific Islander 5th, 7th, and 9th graders being classified as obese.¹⁰

All-Cause Mortality⁸ (Age-adjusted rate per 100,000 people)



- Pacific Islander men have the **highest all-cause mortality rate** in Alameda County.⁸
- The average life expectancy for a Pacific Islander in Alameda County is **77.2 years**, which is lower than the county average of **81.9** years.⁸


Reproductive Health



Alameda County Birth Rates¹¹ (Births per 1,000 people)

- In 2013, there were 197 births to Pacific Islander mothers in Alameda County. Pacific Islanders have the **highest birth rate** in the county with 16.7 births per 1,000 people. The overall Alameda County birth rate is 12.3 births per 1,000 people.¹¹
- 9.1% of Pacific Islander babies are born **premature**, compared to 9.2% of all Alameda County births.¹²

First Trimester Entry into Prenatal Care¹¹ (Percentage)



- 79.2% of Pacific Islander pregnant women receive **prenatal care** in the first trimester, the lowest rate in the county.¹¹
- 6.1% of Pacific Islander births are low birth weight babies, compared to 7.3% of all Alameda County births.¹²

- In 2011, Pacific Islanders had the highest infant mortality rate in California compared to other race/ethnicities with 10.7 infant deaths per 1,000 live births. The state rate was 4.8 infant deaths per 1,000 live births.¹³
- 36.1% of Pacific Islander births are to mothers receiving **Medi-Cal**, higher than the overall county rate of 26.4%.¹¹
- 4.7% of Pacific Islander births are to **teen mothers**, about the same as the county rate of 4.8%.¹²
- Pacific Islanders have the **lowest breastfeeding rates** in the county with 69.6% of Pacific Islander newborns being exclusively breastfed in the hospital. The Alameda County rate is 82.3%.¹⁴
