SF State Inclusion Pilot Project

For Students with Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities

- for students with intellectual and developmental disabilities who are interested in being included in the academic and social components of campus life
- students select their courses from the regular course offerings
- in 2018-19, program starts with one student; in spring 2021, pilot project welcomes a new cohort of three students
- students have taken courses in music, nutrition, dance, English, early childhood development, cinema, kinesiology, and design

The SF State Inclusion Pilot Project provides:

- opportunities for inclusion in the academic and social components of campus life
- a person-centered planning process
- individualized plans of study aligned with students' personal, academic and career goals
- academic coaching provided by trained peer mentors, social support, educational accommodations, and other customized supports
- tuition & fee waivers
- guidance to faculty on inclusive teaching practices









SF State Inclusion Pilot Project

For Students with Intellectual & Developmental Disabilities

The Inclusion Pilot Project is for students with intellectual and developmental disabilities who are interested in being included in the academic and social components of campus life. A person-centered planning process supports students to create an individualized plan of study aligned with their personal, academic and career goals. An individualized plan typically consists of courses, social activities, intern/job activities, housing support, and a career path. Students in the pilot project are not on a degree track but receive a certificate of completion detailing their satisfaction of their academic, social and vocational goals as laid out in their individualized person-centered plan. The SF State Inclusion Pilot Project works to meet students where they are regardless of ability and aspires to make college accessible to everyone.

Meet the Students

This program started with a pilot cohort of three students in spring 2021. The students selected their courses from the regular course offerings open to all SF State students. They each are enrolled in two or three courses of their interest in different departments, and the curriculum is adapted to their individual needs.
